CBS News' Bob Schieffer to speak at TCU Commencement

TCU class of '59 graduate returns to alma mater

CBS NEWS ANCHOR and correspondent Bob Schieffer will be the keynote speaker at TCU's spring commencement-baccalaureate ceremony. Schieffer will address approximately 900 graduating students May 10 in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

Schieffer began his professional career in 1957 while still a student at TCU, where he received a B.A. in journalism and English in 1959.

TCU honored Schieffer with an honorary Doctor of Humanities in 1986 and as homecoming honoree in 1981. He was a member of the TCU Board of Trustees from 1986 until 1994.

Before joining CBS News, he was a reporter at the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* and, in 1965, became the first reporter from a Texas newspaper to report from Vietnam. Schieffer later became news anchor at WBAP-TV (KXAS-TV) Fort Worth/Dallas, a post that eventually led to his joining CBS News.

Schieffer is broadcast journalism's most experienced Washington reporter, has been the anchor and moderator of "Face the Nation," the CBS News public affairs broadcast since May 1991. Schieffer also serves as CBS News Chief Washington correspondent.

Schieffer has covered Washington for CBS for 25 years and is one of the few broadcast or print correspondents to have covered all four major beats in the nation's capitol—the White House, the Pentagon, the State Department and Capitol Hill.

Schieffer, the winner of many broadcast news awards, including five Emmy's and a Delta Sigma Chi award, was a principal anchor for CBS News since 1973, when he was named anchor of the "CBS Sunday Night News."

Schieffer joined CBS News in 1969 and, after a brief stint as a general assignment reporter, was named Pentagon correspondent, a post he held for four years.

He is an Air Force veteran and co-author of *Acting President*, a book about Ronald Reagan published in 1989.

Schieffer was born Feb. 25, 1937 in Austin, Texas. He and his wife reside in Washington, D.C. and have two daughters. ♦

Literary journal announces design contest winners

THE ENGLISH DEPARTMENT'S literary journal *descant* publishes poems and short stories by authors from around the world. Now, after the conclusion of a campus wide contest, the journal will feature art work by TCU students on both the inside and outside of its covers.

Jason Blankenship, a psychology graduate student, won the cover contest with a circular design of a musical score that he thinks is "the definition of *descant* as a musical melody, with poetry as a melody of the spirit." The editors of *descant* have also decided to use additional artwork inspired by Thomas Urquart as story beginning/ending markers.

Descant, Fort Worth's only Journal of Poetry and Fiction, was established in 1957 and is edited by Neil Easterbrook with assistant editors Andrea Wright and Mahala Stripling, and managing editor Billie Hara of the English Department. *Descant* accepts literary submissions from around the world and awards two \$500 prizes annually, the Frank O'Conner Prize for fiction, and the Betsy Colquitt award for poetry. The journal is published twice a year and is sold in area bookstores and through subscription. Cost of a one-year (two volume) subscription is \$8.00, and a subscription card can be found attached to this issue of TCU This Week.
