Schieffer addresses grads as 867 receive diplomas during May 10 Commencement

A TOTAL OF 867 STUDENTS received diplomas during Baccalaureate-Commencement May 10 in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum. Keynote speaker was CBS News anchor Bob Schieffer who advised graduates to, "Pursue the things that interest and excite you and success usually follows."

Schieffer told the audience, "Young people today feel overwhelming pressure to be successful. But I believe you will find greater inner peace if you put aside efforts at success for a while and concentrate instead on pursuing excellence, and there is a great difference in success and excellence."

Nine members of TCU's class of '97 earned a 4.0 grade point average. They are Shelly Diane Bone of Houston, Daniel Robert Cronk Ir. of Grand Island, Neb., Daniela Yavorova Geleva of La Habra, Calif., Stacey Elizabeth Holmes of Glade Spring, Va., Ying Geneve Liu of Fort Worth, Kerri Elyse Rieger of Fairway, Kan., Robin Elizabeth Schieffer of Carthage, Tex., Michael James Wacker of Wichita, Kan. and Laila Wang of Fort Worth. They are among this year's 24 summa cum laude grads. The group also includes 58 magna cum laude graduates and 91 cum laude graduates.

Of the total earned degrees, 664 bachelor's degrees were awarded, 23 Brite Divinity School degrees, 173 master's degrees and seven Ph.D. degrees.

Walsh Center, Ed Landreth looking good for Cliburn International Piano Competition

THEY'VE PUT A FACE ON the F. Howard and Mary D. Walsh Center for Performing Arts. Masons are finishing the limestone facade around the front of the new building, just in time to impress visitors who will begin flocking to Ed Landreth Auditorium on Friday for the Tenth Van Cliburn International Piano Competition.

The Walsh Center is now 35 percent complete, according to Will Stallworth, physical plant director. Nov. 1 is the estimated completion date for the new Fine Arts facility. Weather permitting, the concrete slab roof will be poured this week and, in a month, the roof will be coated with a copper-colored weather surface.

Meanwhile, workmen are finishing up a list of housekeeping chores at Ed Landreth that guarantee the piano music during the Cliburn will be set against the best possible background. Among the completed projects are: painting the auditorium ceiling, replacing the wall carpet in the lobby, carpeting 12 office areas, refinishing the floor in the piano practice room, replacing seats and carpeting in University Theatre and repairing seats in the auditorium. For the past six weeks, painters have been touching up areas of the entire building.

The day before the competition begins, technicians will double check the lighting and air-conditioning systems. Will adds that, since Landreth does not have enough bathrooms to accommodate the Cliburn crowds, an air-conditioned "comfort trailer" containing additional facilities will be moved onto space outside the south side of the auditorium for the duration of the event. •

Engineering class members install aerospace equipment

ENGINEERING PROFESSOR Pat Walter and five TCU undergraduate engineering students traveled to San Juan Capistrano to install a cold gas shock tube for Endevco, the world's largest manufacturer of dynamic instrumentation. The students completed the project as part of their senior design class. Endevco is a subsidiary of Meggitt Aerospace.

The shock tube measures pressure at high temperatures such as are encountered in gas turbine engines. Pat said the hardware his students designed, tested, manufactured and installed will fill a void for companies that have the need to measure dynamic pressure.

The senior design class is part of the Capstone Program, an interdisciplinary experience and industry partnership that exists in university engineering programs throughout the country. However, with only 10 students in the class and a payout of \$14,208 from Endevco, Pat said his class falls into the upper two percent of financing for engineering senior design projects in the United States.

Pat, along with seniors Charles Butzky, Jason Carter, Michael Charlie, Manoj Gopalan and Dinesh Fernando, spent last week installing the approximately 10-foot-long shock tube.
