TCU STUDENTS, FACULTY AND STAFF will celebrate African-American heritage and history through performances, music and exhibits this February.

The observance, traditionally known as Black History Month, will feature several events involving the campus community.

The TCU Jazz Band will give a concert from noon to 1 p.m. in the Student Center lounge.

Buffalo soldier exhibit on display

Artifacts representing the days of the buffalo soldier will be on display from 7 to 10 p.m. in the Student Center ballroom. (Buffalo soldiers were former slaves who served the nation in the Union army. Often overlooked in discussions of history, these soldiers played a vital role in the post-reconstruction era.)

Students play "Jeopardy" game show

Students will compete in a "Jeopardy" game show to educate participants about African-American history from noon to 1 p.m. in the Student Center lounge.

Feb. 17

Students hold talent show, host acts

Students will put on a talent show from noon to 1 p.m. in the Student Center lounge. Local artists have been invited to do "coffee house" style lounge acts for the audience before the show.

Feb. 19

Negro League memorabilia on display

Uniforms, photos and baseball cards from famous Negro League baseball teams that flourished in the first half of this century will be displayed, noon to 8 p.m., Student Center lounge. Special appearances by members of the Texas Rangers baseball club, the Fort Worth Fire and the Dallas Cowboys are scheduled.

Tandy RetroFest '98 brings 1940s to campus

TCU'S COLLEGE OF FINE ARTS AND Communication will join the 40-plus area cultural and educational organizations participating in Tandy RetroFest '98, a community-wide celebration of a decade. This year's event, set for February through April, presents a lineup of events built around the 1940s. The highlights:

- Film Noir, a series of evening lectures and screenings of and about the film genre of the era. From John Huston's The Maltese Falcon to Billy Wilder's Double Indemnity, the decade unfolds on six Thursday nights, beginning Feb. 19. Each is set for 7 p.m. in Rm. 164S of the J.M. Moudy Bldg.
- Classical Excursions Rosemary Solomons will feature music and events from the 1940s on KTCU FM 88.7 from 10 a.m. to noon Fridays, from Feb. 20 through April 10.
- Monday Night Recital/Concert Series Free public performances of 1940s work by TCU faculty and musical groups at 7:30 p.m. Mondays throughout the spring.
- Romeo and Juliet State Theatre Koleso of Togliatti, Russia returns to TCU for a RetroFest production of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, set against the background of the Cold War. TCU students will play the Montagues while the Russians portray the Capulets...each in their own language. Play dates Feb. 25 March 1
- Forward to the Past The Department of Ballet and Modern Dance will premiere original works that evoke the 1940s, from "story ballets" to jazz. 8 p.m. Feb. 27-28, 2 p.m. March 1
- Salute to the Big Bands TCU's annual Jazz Festival pays tribute to the sounds of the 1940s at 8 p.m. April 4, Ed Landreth Auditorium. Featured soloist with the TCU Jazz Ensemble is Las Vegas jazz trombonist Carl Fontana. Tickets are \$8 for adults, \$6 for students.
- 1940s Radio Hour TCU Theatre presents a musical trip down memory lane with this toe-tapping production, set at a Manhattan radio station just before Christmas 1942.

This TCU Guild production is set to run at 8 p.m. April 15-18 and at 2 p.m. April 18 and 19 in the Spencer and Marlene Hays Theatre of the Mary D. and F. Howard Walsh Center for Performing Arts.
