First Latin American Music Festival debuts next week, noted performers due

FROM 8 A.M. LECTURES TO NIGHTTIME concerts, a unique experience is about to be offered to the North Texas community . . .total immersion in classical music that is scarcely known in the United States.

It is TCU's first-ever Latin American Music Festival, bringing together composers and talent from such countries as Mexico, Peru, Spain, Argentina, Panama, Brazil and Colombia. Many TCU music faculty and students will also be involved over the two days of performances.

This premiere event is set for April 23-24, with programs scheduled in both Ed Landreth Auditorium and the new PepsiCo Recital Hall. The man behind the project is Germán Gutiérrez, conductor of the TCU Symphony, who came here nearly two years ago to establish a Center for Latin American Music on campus.

"We have great composers," says Gutiérrez, noting that this is serious music for orchestras, chamber groups and choirs, differing from the folk music or mariachi sound that is familiar to many Americans.

While Germán will blend a sprinkling of those familiar rhythms into the festival as well, his focus is on introducing audiences to the more sophisticated sounds of Latin America. There will be performances by the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra, TCU Symphony Orchestra and TCU faculty.

Music is not the only element of the festival, according to Germán. "It is a celebration of Latin American culture. There will be a variety of things to learn about and experience," he explains, noting that ethnic foods, folk dances and an exhibition of Pre-Columbian art are also part of the program. (Marriott will offer Latino cuisine in the campus dining facilities while area groups entertain with live music).

Guest speakers include DePaul University musicologist Enrique Arias, who will give the keynote address, University of Northern Colorado professor Kenneth Singleton, Michael Meckna (music) and composer Luis Jorge González. Each lecture will be accompanied by music.

Except for a Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra performance on April 23, all events are free and open to the public. A complete schedule will run in this publication next week and also appears on the Festival Web page at tcu.edu. •

NEXT WEEK'S FOCUS ON LATIN American music will open with the TCU Opera Theater production of *La Dolorosa*, a Spanish "zarzuela," directed by Richard Estes (music). Performances are at 7:30 p.m. April 20-21 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Admission is free.

La Dolorosa is one of the most popular examples of the Spanish zarzuela tradition...a musical dramatic form with spoken dialogue. Originating in the early 17th century, the zarzuela took the form and style by which it is now known around 1839. La Dolorosa was first performed in 1930 and has remained a staple in the zarzuela genre. Its contrast of comic characters, scenes and music with the elegant and dramatic are a hallmark of this theatrical form.

The TCU production will feature English dialogue and musical numbers in Spanish.

BILL MONCRIEF (MARKETING) HAS been named a 1998-99 fellow for the American Council on Education (ACE) to study the selection and development of university faculty for the 21st century.

Bill is among 35 fellows named this year in a national competition, and will work at an as yet undetermined university beginning in the fall under a provost or chancellor as part of the program.

"I am excited about having the opportunity to examine some of the issues that will affect university faculty in the 21st century," says Bill. "It will be particularly rewarding to spend a semester at another university studying with their administration, seeing different perspectives, and then hopefully bringing those results back to TCU," he said.

The decision to nominate Bill Moncrief for the program was University-wide, involving the chancellor and the provost among others, according to Kirk Downey, business school dean.

"The University picks someone who they think is a future leader in higher education," says Kirk.

According to Kirk, TCU has not nominated anyone for this honor in many years. •

A screening mammogram is a low dose x-ray of the breast, proven effective in the early detection of breast cancer, when it is most curable.

Women who have no known breast problems, do not have breast implants or are not pregnant or breast-feeding are eligible for this service.
