TCU will host luncheon, send faculty to judge International Science Fair

THE BEST AND BRIGHTEST OF YOUNG people in the field of science will gather in Fort. Worth next week when the International Science and Engineering Fair convenes. Approximately 1,000 finalists from school and regional fairs across the country and from more than 30 foreign lands will participate in the event May 10-16 at Tarrant County Convention Center.

On May 12, approximately 250 international high school students and student advisors have been invited to a luncheon in the Student Center ballroom. According to **Delia Pitts** (international education) who has organized the event, TCU is co-hosting the luncheon with TU Electric/Lone Star Gas. Plans are to welcome the contingent to Fort Worth and TCU with an international menu, served buffet-style, and musical entertainment by TCU international students.

Numerous TCU faculty members will act as ISEF judges in various categories. Participating from the biology department are Rudolf Brun, Ray Drenner, Gary Ferguson, Phil Hartman, Glenn Kroh and Pat Paulus. Chemistry faculty includes Bob Neilson, Joe Bobich, Manfred Reinecke, John Albright and Jeff Coffer. Engineering faculty include Bob Bittle, Ed Kolesar, Andrew Mazzoleni, Hal Nelson, Pat Walter and Steve Weis.

Physics faculty members who will be judging are C.A. Quarles, Bill Graham, Magnus Rittby, T.W. Zerda, Pam Marcum and Mike Wharton. Those from the geology department will be Ken Morgan, Art Busbey, Nowell Donovan, Art Ehlmann and Richard Hanson.

Three TCU math professors have been chosen by the American Mathematical Society to join the AMS judging panel to select the "best of show" awardees of the Karl Menger prizes, including \$1,000 to the top winner. Those faculty members are Bob Doran, Rhonda Hatcher and Victor Belfi. Rhonda, Ken Richardson and Ze-Li Dou will be grand prize judges in the mathematics division, representing TCU.

Dick Rinewalt, Bonnie Melhart and

Craig Morgenstern, all of the computer science department, will be judges for Sigma Xi, the scientific research society. James Comer and Tom Nute from computer science, will represent TCU. John Householder (admissions) also has volunteered to be a judge.

Other members of the University faculty and staff have volunteered to serve as language interpreters during the Science Fair. It has been previously announced that TCU will award eight full tuition scholarships, valued at \$47,000 each, to winners in each ISEF category: biology, chemistry, computer science, engineering, environmental science, geological and earth sciences, math and physics. "This is the premiere science fair in the world," says Provost Bill Koehler. "We know that these bright, young minds would be challenged and excel at TCU and we are pleased to offer these scholarships to recognize their achievements and potential."

In addition to scholarship offers and awards, the grand prize winner will receive an all-expenses-paid trip to the Nobel Prize ceremonies in Stockholm, Sweden. Other prizes include complimentary trips to the European Union Contest and the All South American Science and Technology Fair.

This 49th ISEF is hosted by Intel Corp., the City of Fort Worth and Science Service, a nonprofit organization based in Washington, D.C., formed to increase public undertanding of science. Fort Worth is the only city in the world to be selected as host to ISEF for a third time. ◆

TCU WOMEN'S GOLF COACH ANGIE Ravaioli-Larkin and her TCU Lady Frog golfers are headed to Duke University for the 1998 Division I Women's Golf Championships east regional to be held Thursday through Saturday.

The west regional will be held simultaneously at Stanford University. The two regionals are held to determine the championship field. A total of 204 participants have been selected for the regional competition with 99 of those players advancing to the championship finals May 20-23 at University Ridge Golf Course in Madison, Wis.

TCU is joined by other west district teams Tulsa, New Mexico State, Texas A&M, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas Tech, New Mexico and Missouri. ◆
