# Frog Camps under way, including our own Habitat for Humanity house

WHILE THE TCU CAMPUS SWELTERS this month in the Texas heat, some 90 incoming TCU students (along with faculty and staff mentors) are rafting, rock climbing and rappelling their way across the cool peaks of Colorado. The first of four Frog Camps began June 9 at Taylor Park, Colorado. More campers will begin their Rocky Mountain journey tomorrow (June 16).

More than 850 new freshman and transfer students will participate this year in TCU Frog Camps. Offered as a complementary program to TCU's traditional orientation activities, Frog Camps immerse new students in TCU history and traditions and help them establish new friendships in four distinct settings, all away from the TCU campus.

Frog Camp Alpine takes students on a five-day Colorado mountain adventure that includes white-water rafting, low and high team challenge courses, rock climbing and rappelling. The remaining camps take place in August and September. Frog Camp Challenge will be held at the Greene Family Camp, a modern camp facility south of Waco where campers work together on a team-building challenge course. Frog Camp Quest will convene at the Fort Worth YMCA's Camp Carter and campers work together on a TCU Habitat for Humanity House funded in part by the Maxwell House Coffee Corporation.

New this year is Frog Camp Excursion. Located at Camp Sweeney in Gainesville, Excursion participants will work together on a fun and exciting outdoor navigation project involving hiking and traditional summer camp activities.

"We wanted to add another environment to provide students more variety," said Barbara Brown Herman (student development services). "The Gainesville location presents different challenges but accomplishes the same goals."

Activities in every camp involve frank, small group discussions, team-building exercises, skits, spirit sessions and fireside chats.

Faculty and staff mentors are a key component to the TCU Frog Camp experience, Barbara said.
