The United Way pledge form and why you should turn one in ... a new view

WHEN UNITED WAY TIME ROLLS around each year, a couple of sure things spring to mind. Watch a video, receive a pledge form.

Not every faculty/staff member can manage to attend a screening of United Way's annual video, but everyone at TCU receives the form.

And organizers of the campus campaign emphasize the importance of turning in your form. In other words, don't throw it away!

The reason? It's a bookkeeping thing, according to **Larry Lauer** (associate vice chancellor for communications and public affairs) who is TCU campaign chairman. "Returning the form is the only way we can be certain that all gifts are in at the close of the campaign," Larry says. "In previous years, we would declare our campaign closed, add the totals, turn in the money and have United Way record the totals, only to find out several days later that more pledges had come in but TCU didn't get credited for the additional amount."

"It isn't that we're noting who's not giving," he explains. "On the contrary, getting all the forms back is our way of knowing that no potential gifts are out there that might come in late."

For anyone who's on the fence about donating to the campaign, Larry says he can relate. "Like everyone else, I have certain favorite organizations and charities and, on a given day, I would prefer to contribute to them. But, I've also had the experience of having some needs develop in my own family that required the services of organizations I had never anticipated I would contact. By supporting a wide range of community services in this way, we can be assured that they will be there for us in the future," Larry explains.

More than 40 agencies and services are supported by United Way efforts. There are many TCU people who serve on the boards of organizations supported by the United Way, as well as many TCU people receiving direct help from agencies supported by the United Way. A complete listing of partner agencies is listed on the United Way brochure attached to the pledge form.

Pledge forms and contributions are due back in the appropriate vice chancellor's office by Friday. ♦

FW Weekly pays tribute to Germán Gutiérrez, KTCU

A RECENT ISSUE OF *FW WEEKLY*, THE local entertainment guide, listed two College of Fine Arts and Communication entities among its "1998 Best of the West-o-Plex" listings. The staff named TCU's director of orchestral studies **Germán Gutiérrez** "best musician" in the area. Their description: "The convincingly dedicated conductor of the TCU Orchestra also spends his time with just about every other ensemble in the Metroplex, from the Dallas Symphony Orchestra to a group of sixth-grade beginning violinists on Fort Worth's East Side. This man with a mission will single-handedly ensure the future of contemporary Latin American classical music or will die trying."

Of KTCU, the publication wrote that the station is "FW/D's most under-appreciated musical asset. From 8 p.m. to 2 a.m., a handful of TCU subversives spin the best music in radioland. If you hear it here, you hear it first and there's no such thing as heavy rotation." ♦

1998-99 men's basketball schedule announced

TCU MEN'S BASKETBALL COACH **Billy Tubbs** announced what he calls one of the toughest schedules in TCU basketball history. This season, the Frogs are slated to face six teams that were post-season participants last year. However, after leading the nation in scoring and posting the winningest season in school history, the Frogs seem up to the challenge.

Senior and National Player of the Year candidate Lee Nailon withdrew himself from the National Basketball Association draft and returns for his senior year. Joining him is starting point guard Prince Fowler who averaged 6.1 steals per game over the last 10 games of the season.

This year TCU's season gets under way at the CoSIDA Classic as the Frogs face the University of Rhode Island, Nov. 9 in Providence. Last year, the Rams made it to the "Elite Eight" before being eliminated from the NCAA Tournament. Other participants in the tournament include Vanderbilt and Providence.

Also returning from last year's team are Ryan Carroll, Scott Gradney and Thomas McTyer.

Billy is also looking for contributions from a solid recruiting class that includes junior college transfers Marquise Gainous, Vladimir Jaksic, Shannon Long, Derale Wilson and freshmen Michael Causey and Rebel Paulk.

Besides the CoSIDA Classic, TCU can expect a tough road schedule that includes games against Southwest Missouri State and Western Athletic Conference rivals SMU, UNLV and Tulsa.

THEATRE TCU OPENS ITS 54TH SEASON with Euripides' great tragedy *The Trojan Women* at 8 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday and 2 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. The performances coincide with TCU Family Weekend.

The 90-minute, no-intermission production features 27 student actors, according to director **George Brown**. "It's a fallacy that Greek tragedy is dead and boring," he adds. "We've adapted this show to make it much more contemporary, plus it's very theatrical and has surprising effects."
