Lamar Alexander to speak at first Fogelson Honors Forum on Oct. 13

FORMER U.S. SECRETARY OF Education Lamar Alexander will be the featured speaker at the inaugural Fogelson Honors Forum, set for 8 p.m. Tuesday Oct. 13 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. His lecture is titled "Violence in Our Schools: Exploring Solutions."

General admission is \$5 and students and seniors, \$3. Tickets are being sold at the Student Center information desk and will be available at the door on the night of the lecture. Credit cards cannot be accepted. Reserved priority seating, priced at \$100, includes a parking pass and pre-lecture cocktail buffet at Colonial Country Club from 6 to 7:30 p.m. Call ext. 6488 for information.

A separate reception at 5 p.m. in the Dee J. Kelly Alumni and Visitors Center will allow honors students time for an informal visit with Alexander.

Through a \$1 million gift from the estates of Dallasite Buddy Fogelson and his wife, the actress Greer Garson, this new TCU program will bring to campus well-known thinkers to share ideas and engage in conversation with the TCU and Fort Worth communities. Alexander, who is thought likely to seek the Republican presidential nomination in 2000, is a former governor of Tennessee, served as Secretary of Education under President George Bush and was president of the University of Tennessee.

An outspoken critic of America's educational system, Alexander outlines six steps to building better schools. They are: apply world-class standards, locally set; pay good teachers more; end teacher tenure; free schools from most union rules and government regulations; fit school schedules to parents' work schedules and establish a federal Hope scholarship to give children choices of schools. "How could the U.S.A.—the country that invented the Internet, explored Mars and created almost all the great universities—not have the best schools in the world for its children?" he asks.

DR. LARRY WOLZ, PROFESSOR OF music history and voice at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene will deliver the eighth annual Michael M. Winesanker Musicology Lecture at 3 p.m. Friday in Ed Landreth Hall, Rm. 103.

His topic is "Frank Van der Stucken and American Music Boosterism in the Late 19th Century." Van der Stucken was a Texas composer-conductor, born in Fredericksburg in 1858, who is thought to have had great influence in promoting American music in the late 1800s.
