TCU Alumni Association will honor eight Nov. 5

THE TCU ALUMNI ASSOCIATION WILL present its 1998 alumni awards at a reception and dinner at 6:45 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 5 at River Crest Country Club.

Honorees include Aubrey E. Taylor '60 of Mobile, Ala., Clarence Scharbauer III '73 of Midland, Dr. Louis H. Barnett, J. Roger Williams '72, Frank Windegger '57, Robert E. Johnson Jr. '68 of Houston, William W. Harrell '69 and Andy Mitchell '98.

The Alumni Awards dinner will be the first event of the 1998 Homecoming/Reunion Weekend.

Taylor, who is to receive the Distinguished Alumnus Award, is a noted researcher, teacher, author and leader in the field of physiology. Scharbauer, a Trustee since 1991, will be presented the Valuable Alumnus Award for his work as co-chair of The Next Frontier Campaign which brought in \$126 million for TCU.

Barnett, a Trustee, will be presented with the Honorary Alumnus Award for his longstanding relationship with the University and his contributions to the Fort Worth community. He is honorary co-chair of TCU's Jewish Studies Program. The recently established Madlyn and Louis Barnett Visiting Scholars program in Jewish Literature and Thought will bring eminent scholars to TCU from universities outside the United States to teach at Brite Divinity School and offer public lectures and seminars.

Williams, who makes his home in Weatherford, will be presented with the Royal Purple Award for his service and philanthropy. When he was volunteer chairman of the Committee of 100, he put in nearly eight hours a day from 1996 to 1998, selling TCU athletics and boosting the committee's membership to 300.

Windegger, TCU athletics director for more than 22 years, will receive the Frog O' Fame Award for his numerous achievements since arriving on campus as a student athlete 45 years ago.

Johnson, who will receive the Alumni Service Award, has been called "one of the pillars of TCU's alumni program." An accomplished public speaker, he has been emcee or speaker at numerous University affairs, has recruited students from his area for decades and has hosted many events in Houston.
