Thomas to lead diversity initiative

CORNELL THOMAS (EDUCATION) HAS been named Chair of the Chancellor's Council on Diversity and Special Assistant to the Chancellor for Diversity and Community.

In this new role, Cornell will coordinate the initiatives of the Council to spearhead the University's commitment to and evaluate our progress in building diversity in the student body, faculty and staff.

"Professor Thomas has long provided leadership for strengthening the sense of community at TCU among faculty, staff and students," says Chancellor Michael R. Ferrari. "He has been active in linking the University with public schools and other groups in the community."

As chair of the Council, Cornell will work with the Chancellor to identify new ways for the University to affirm its commitment to diversity in all its dimensions. This goal is evident in the Council's current working definition of diversity.

"Diversity is the mosaic of people who bring a variety of backgrounds, styles, perspectives, values, and beliefs as assets to the groups and organizations with which they interact."

In the near future, the Council plans to begin assessing current campus attitudes about diversity that will eventually lead to the formation of an action plan.

"I hope that we can begin to more clearly see how our wants and needs as human beings are very similar," says Cornell. "We will then have the kind of solid foundations needed to embrace the talents each of us brings to TCU, thus helping us to achieve desired goals as a community of learners."

Currently 12% of TCU students and 11% of faculty and staff are from minority populations, excluding international students. For several years, TCU has sought to increase minority enrollment and employment of minority faculty and staff numbers. The Council's formation signals a renewed commitment to achieving this longstanding goal.

Cornell will office in Sadler Rm 325, in addition to maintaining his office in the Bailey Bldg.

TCU offering \$10,000 reward after recent sexual assault case

THE UNIVERSITY LAST WEEK announced the offer of a \$10,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the person suspected in a string of off-campus sexual assaults involving TCU students. The assaults began in January 1998. None have occurred on campus.

The latest incident occurred Jan. 17th in an apartment complex south of campus. Three TCU students have been sexually assaulted since the incidents began. Fort Worth police believe the same suspect may have committed the crimes.

"This reward provides another tool to assist the Fort Worth Police Department in capturing the person responsible for these terrible crimes," said **Don Mills**, vice chancellor for student affairs.

"TCU police officers are assisting the Fort Worth Police Department by adding extra patrols in the neighborhoods surrounding the campus," Don said. "We hope this reward will encourage someone to come forward with information that will give police the details they need to make an arrest as quickly as possible."

Fort Worth Police have only a vague description of the male suspect. He dresses in dark clothes with a black ski mask pulled down over his face. TCU Police are urging all students, staff and faculty to report any suspicious person or activity immediately. If you are on campus, dial ext. 7777. Off campus, dial 911.

The Fort Worth Police Department will administer the reward fund. The department will determine who would be eligible to receive the reward and distribute the funds accordingly. Individuals with information should call the Fort Worth Police Department at 877-8316 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. After business hours, contact Tarrant County Crimestoppers at 469-TIPS (8477). If callers wish to remain anonymous, they may call the Crimestoppers hotline, however, police say

- Leave outside lights on at night and keep lights on in more than one room.
- Lock all doors and windows, keep blinds and curtains drawn.
- Before walking several blocks home from campus, call for an escort.

- Keep car doors locked at all
- Always look in your back seat before entering your car.
- Always have keys ready to unlock the car door and enter without delay.
