## **Spring 1999 Trustees Report**

IN HIS REPORT TO THE BOARD OF Trustees on Friday, Chancellor Michael Ferrari outlined a number of priorities and initiatives that will strengthen academic programs and have positive long-term impact on the future of the University.

"The 1999-2000 budget plan and the launching of a vigorous strategic planning effort are important steps in positioning TCU for greater national stature and visibility," said Ferrari. "The budget plan sustains the University's momentum in several important areas, including faculty and staff compensation, academic program enhancement and innovation, student services and facilities, technology improvements, physical plant projects, athletics and marketing support and creative outreach to the community," Ferrari told the Board.

"The National Commission on the Future of TCU, a comprehensive strategic planning process composed of a dozen task forces examining all aspects of University life, will get under way in the next few months and culminate next spring in a bold plan for the continuing progress of the University," he said.

### **Budget items**

Trustees approved a new operating budget of \$156 million and a tuition rate of \$365 per semester hour (an increase of \$20 per hour from the current year).

The fiscal 2000 budget plan provides funding in several key areas, Ferrari stated. These include:

- A four percent merit salary pool for continuing faculty and staff, an additional \$600 per year across-the-board wage increase for members of the general staff and an increase in the University contribution to the retirement program of general staff from 6.5 percent to 8.5 percent of base pay.
- The addition of 21 new faculty positions to strengthen liberal arts undergraduate education and support new program initiatives in management information systems and computer information systems.
- The addition of six information technology staff to support the expanded use of technology in teaching and learning.
- \$1.7 million in additional funding for scholarships and financial aid, including a new merit scholarship program for upperclass students and expanded support for study abroad opportunities.
  - Increased support for classroom,

equipment, computing laboratories, science equipment and library acquisitions.

- Funding for Phase II improvements to residence halls in Worth Hills and Phase I improvements to Foster Residence Hall.
- Funding of new outreach and educational programs to the community.

Trustees were also told of several major gifts received in the past few months:

- \$3.5 million from John Justin for the new athletic learning center.
- \$1 million from Robert and Maria Lowdon for the new athletic track.
- \$500,000 from Deedie and Rusty Rose for the Tucker Technology Center.

# Festival next week will celebrate American composer Charles Ives

THE LIFE AND WORKS OF CHARLES IVES, the first American composer to earn a truly international reputation, will be explored and celebrated with special on-campus events April 5-7. **Gerry Gabel** (music) has organized the series of lectures, recitals and concerts which are free and open to the public.

The grand finale on the last evening features the world premiere of the original orchestration of Ives' *Three Places in New England*, performed by the TCU Symphony, conducted by James Sinclair. According to Gerry, that work has been called "the quintessential Ives' work" by WGBH-TV, Boston.

Born in Danbury, Conn. in 1874, Ives lived and worked in New York City until his death in 1954. As influential as his musical work was, he was actually a leader in the insurance industry by profession and only composed at home in his spare time.

Monday's schedule opens with a 9 a.m. lecture by TCU graduate Lynne Guess Brandt. Dr. Noel Zahler will talk on Answering Some Unanswered Questions at 10 a.m. Curt Thompson (music) will lecture on A Wild, Heroic Ride to Heaven at 11 a.m. All take place in PepsiCo Recital Hall. Jan Swafford and Noel Zahler will meet with composers in Ed Landreth Rm. 207 at 2 p.m.

A 7:30 p.m. recital in PepsiCo Recital Hall will feature Curt on violin and Rodney Waters on piano, performing three Charles Ives' sonatas.

FEMALE FACULTY AND STAFF, AGES 35 and above, are invited to take advantage of services provided by the Harris Methodist-Fort Worth Doris Kupferle Mobile Mammography Screening Unit. The van will be parked behind the human resources building from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. April 21 and 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. April 22.

A screening mammogram is a low dose x-ray of the breast, proven effective in the early detection of breast cancer, when it is most curable

Women who have no known breast problems, do not have breast implants or are not pregnant or breastfeeding are eligible for this service.

Medicaid, Medicare or private health insurance will be billed on your behalf. Please bring your health insurance card with you to the appointment. There are special funds set aside for low-income women who meet financial eligibility requirements.

Harris HMO guidelines for coverage allow a screening once between the ages of 35 and 40, screening every other year between the ages of 40 and 49 and screening every year following 50 years old.

### **Board hears other issues**

In other matters, the board:

- Approved a joint resolution with the trustees of Brite Divinity School to establish a special task force charged with examining the bylaws and governing documents of both institutions and building on the historic relationships and cooperative spirit between TCU and Brite.
- Elected three new trustees: Robert D. Krebs, chairman, president and CEO of Burlington Northern Santa Fe Corporation; Leonard H. Roberts, president and CEO of Tandy Corporation, and Patricia Penrose Schieffer of Washington, D.C., who served as a trustee from 1971-1979 and is the wife of CBS newsman Bob Schieffer, also a former trustee.
- Thanked board members Louis H. Barnett and Malcolm K. Brachman for their years of service to the board and elected them as honorary trustees.
- Re-elected eight board members to four-year terms expiring in March 2003: William L. Adams, J. Kelly Cox, Kay Kimbell Fortson, Spencer Hays, Ann McArron Jones, Dee J. Kelly, John C. Schweitzer and F. Howard Walsh Jr.
- Re-elected John Roach to another term as board chairman, a post he's held since 1990, and re-elected Vernon Smith of Dallas as vice chairman.


### Faculty matters

## Athletic facility to be named for John S. Justin

A \$3.5 MILLION DONATION FROM longtime TCU trustee John S. Justin has provided the naming gift for a \$7 to \$8 million facility adjacent to Daniel-Meyer Coliseum that will contain administrative offices for TCU Athletics, the football office and an athletic learning center. The gift was announced during the Spring board of trustees meeting Friday.

Construction is expected to begin in June on the John Justin Athletic Center, named for the retiring CEO and chairman of Justin Industries who has been a TCU trustee since 1979.

"I am so very excited about the direction and commitment of our athletics program," Justin said. "I am pleased to have this opportunity to enhance the TCU athletics program, aid our student-athletes and coaching staffs, whereby the institution may continue to provide an exceptional educational and athletic experience for so many young people."

The self-contained learning center will provide academic support service for student athletes under one roof, including study space, areas for tutors to work with students, private office space for academic counselors, study lounge and small classroom spaces for one-on-one or group tutoring sessions and life skills training. The football team currently holds its study halls and team meetings in its film room, located in a separate building from the dressing room and football office.

The Justin Athletic Center represents ongoing progress on a \$10 million project to improve TCU athletic facilities. It is expected that, within one year, work will be under way or completed on three other structures. These include:

The Robert and Maria Lowdon Track, an outdoor facility that will enable TCU to host major track and field events. Construction is set to begin in mid-April on the site of the existing football and soccer practice fields.

New football practice fields on the site of the former track, made possible by a gift from Clifton and Sheridan Morris.

New soccer field, funded in part by the Garvey Texas Foundation.

The initiatives to improve TCU athletic facilities will help make TCU more competitive nationally. TCU trustees have already approved, in concept, future athletic facilities, including a multipurpose indoor sports center, a baseball field and improvements for Daniel-Meyer Coliseum and Amon Carter Stadium.

"This is a wonderful commitment that will continue to move the TCU Athletics department into the 21st century," said Athletics Director Eric Hyman. "The Justin Center will show all prospective studentathletes that TCU is committed to a nationally prominent program."
