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Public TV execs bring worldwide perspective to TCU-sponsored conference

TCU, KERA/KDTN AND THE CITY OF FORT Worth have joined forces to host 800-plus public television directors, producers, writers and executives from 37 countries for INPUT '99, the International Public Television Screening Conference to be held April 25-30 in downtown Fort Worth.

Although the conference itself is closed, the public has a chance to participate in the international event by attending public screenings of television programming from Canada, England and the United States. These events are scheduled for 7 p.m. next Monday and Tuesday at the Caravan of Dreams, 312 Houston St., and 7 p.m. April 29-30 in the Moudy Bldg., Rm. 164S. A reception will be held at 6 p.m., before each screening. (See attached flyer for programming information.)

Ken Parish Perkins, television critic for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, will be the moderator at all four events. At each screening, the producer of that evening's program is scheduled to discuss the work. David Whillock and Joan McGettigan (rtvf) will assist at the two on-campus screenings.

Larry Lauer, associate vice chancellor for communications and public affairs, was instrumental in bringing the global conference to Fort Worth...only the fifth time in its 22-year history that the annual event has come to the United States. He credits the idea to his experience teaching abroad and the rich resources available here, according to a recent article by Shawn Shepherd in *The Business Press*.

It was during annual summer treks to London to teach TCU's media studies course there that he became acquainted with INPUT through British colleagues. When one came to Fort Worth to lecture and fell in love with the city, the notion of holding the international conference here was hatched. "He was the first to suggest this as a location (for INPUT) because they are always looking for interesting and compelling cities and not just the typical convention city," Larry explains.

Twenty-five board members from 18 countries made a site visit here in 1997. "When they saw the city, it cinched the deal," Larry adds.

Headquarters for the conference will be at The Worthington Hotel and the grand opening ceremonies will take place Sunday night at the Bass Performance Hall.
