# TCU will reorganize academic structure, expand to eight colleges and schools

CHANCELLOR MICHAEL R. FERRARI announced Wednesday the reorganization of TCU's academic structure to better position us for ongoing academic development and reinforce our determination to move to the next level of distinction in American private higher education.

The modification, which has been endorsed by senior administrative officers, deans, and the executive committees of the Faculty Senate and TCU Board of Trustees, will become effective summer 2000. The 1999-2000 academic year will be a transition period for full implementation of the reorganization from six to eight colleges and schools:

- ■AddRan College of Arts and Sciences will be divided into two colleges AddRan College of Liberal Arts and College of Science and Engineering.
- College of Fine Arts and Communication also will be divided into two colleges College of Fine Arts and College of Communication.
- ■A new College of Health Sciences and Human Services will be comprised of the Harris School of Nursing and other healthrelated and human service fields.
- ■The School of Education and the M. J. Neeley School of Business will retain their current structure. Brite Divinity School will not be affected by these organizational changes.

Chancellor Ferrari will discuss the reorganization and answer questions at an open meeting at 4 p.m. Wednesday (Aug. 25) in the Faculty Center of Dave Reed Hall. All interested faculty and staff are urged to attend this informative session.

Regarding the rationale for restructuring, Chancellor Ferrari said, "In listening to faculty and staff since joining TCU, I became increasingly aware of continuing concerns regarding the ability of our current academic structure to meet the needs of the future. The prevailing perception is that the current structure does not convey the strength and diversity of our academic offerings or provide the optimum context to develop new and emerging undergraduate and graduate programs."

"With these observations in mind and the need to establish in the coming weeks the college and school task forces for The Commission on the Future of TCU, I believe it is timely for us to have in place a structure that will fulfill our mission and vision," he added.

A national search for dean of AddRan College of Liberal Arts will be initiated this fall with the expectation that a new dean will be in place no later than next summer. Dean **Michael McCracken**, current dean of AddRan, will become dean of the College of Science and Engineering effective June 1, 2000.

David Whillock, interim dean of the College of Fine Arts and Communication, will oversee the creation of a College of Fine Arts and a College of Communication. A national search for dean of the College of Fine Arts will start this fall with the expectation that a new dean would be in place no later than next summer. A national search for dean of the College of Communication will commence in fall 2000.

Dr. Rhonda Keen-Payne, current dean of the Harris College of Nursing, will become dean of the College of Health Sciences and Human Services next summer, and provide leadership this year for the incorporation of the Harris School of Nursing and other departments selected for the new college.

National deanship searches for the M. J. Neeley School of Business and the School of Education will proceed as planned with the expectation that permanent deans will be in place no later than next summer.

This announcement enables the task forces of The Commission on the Future of TCU to be formed based on the new college/school structure. Chairs and other members of the task forces will be selected from constituent and stakeholder groups consistent with the new academic design. The Commission on the Future of TCU is intended to engage and mobilize more than 400 TCU constituents, alumni and other stakeholders in a collaborative planning effort to position TCU for increased stature in American private higher education. ◆

A native of Blue Springs, Mo., Mittle earned his undergraduate degree in sports management from Missouri Western in 1989, and his master's in sports administration from the United States Sports Academy in Mobile, Ala., in 1992. From 1989 through 1991, he
