Berry St. eatery transformed into TCU Administrative Annex

THE OLD COLONIAL CAFETERIA AT THE corner of Berry Street and Sandage Avenue is looking more like a TCU building every day. And a recently completed sign over the doorway makes it official ... we now have a "TCU Administrative Annex."

The renovated structure will be the permanent location for the University's Institute of Behavioral Research after mid-April when **Dwayne Simpson** and his 35 IBR staff members move in. According to **Larry Garrison** (facilities planning), the former restaurant measures slightly under 10,000 square feet and provides about 6,500 square feet of usable office space. The interior was gutted as all the remnants of kitchen equipment and food service were hauled away.

The building is very well constructed, according to Larry. A new roof and air conditioning system were installed, new restrooms were built and all-new furnishings have been ordered. There will be ample parking across Sandage in leased space on the former Blockbuster lot.

Attractive curbside landscaping will improve the neighboring street scene. Although the structure is red brick, TCU brick is being added to the exterior. Whether or not to paint the outside is undecided at this point, Larry says.

"I think it's something TCU will be proud of," he says, with an eye to the finished project.

According to Will Stallworth (physical plant), the economics department will be relocated to the IBR trailer left vacant by the move.

Grant will help underwrite master's degrees online

TCU HAS RECEIVED A \$240,000 GRANT from eCollege.com to offer online master's degrees in both liberal arts and nursing. The University had already established a relationship with the Colorado-based company which provides the technology for TCU's existing online classes.

An online master's in liberal arts will be an added option to the MLA program. The nursing master's, however, will be a first-time offering and will only be available online.
