Honors Week brings TCU academics center stage with speakers, awards

THE FOCUS FALLS ON SCHOLARLY presentations, banquets, speakers and awards as TCU's 39th Honors Week unfolds on campus today through Thursday.

Dr. Robert Pinsky, Poet Laureate of the United States and Cecil H. and Ida Green Honors Chair Professor, is guest speaker for the Honors Convocation at 11 a.m. April 13 in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

Betsy Colquitt (emeritus professor of English) will introduce Dr. Pinsky, whose address is titled *Learning and Art*. **Kathy McDorman** (director, honors program) will open the program which includes the presentation of the Honors Faculty Recognition Award for 2000. The event is free and open to the public as is an Honors Forum with Dr. Pinsky at 2 p.m. Thursday in the Student Center, rm. 222.

Other Honors Week activities include the presentation of senior honors projects from 3 to 6 p.m. today and Tuesday in the Moudy Bldg., rm. 320S. Honors Week Chair **Andy**

Paquet (biology) and **Helen McCaffrey** (communication sciences and disorders) will preside over the sessions.

An honors recital, presented by Pi Kappa Lambda, is set for 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Performers were selected by auditions open to all TCU music students and include Federico Hood-Perez (violin), Tanya Karyagina (piano), David McDonald (piano), Santiago Paez (flute), Yhasmin Valenzuela (clarinet), Mark Stamper (piano) and Amy Pummill (organ).

The Honors Banquet is set for 6:30 p.m. Thursday in Cox Banquet Hall of the Dee J. Kelly Alumni & Visitors Center. **Linda K. Hughes** (English), recipient of the 1999 Honors Faculty Recognition Award, will be the featured speaker. Her topic is *Millennial Musings: Why Read Victorian Poetry in the 21st Century?*

Composers offer world premieres for this week's Latin American Music Festival

TWO YEARS AFTER TCU'S FIRST LATIN American Music Festival made its debut on campus, the three-day event returns April 13-15. It is a unique opportunity for Texas audiences to see and hear composers and talent from South America, performing classical music rarely heard in the United States...including five world premieres.

Concerts are set for 7:30 p.m. Thursday and Friday, and 2 p.m. Saturday in Ed Landreth Auditorium, while lectures and recitals are scheduled for the afternoons in PepsiCo Recital Hall. All events are free and open to the public.

"The five pieces we're premiering here have been offered by the composers; we did not commission them," says LAMF organizer **Germán Gutiérrez**. "It shows the quality of this festival...for these prestigious composers to write new works to be performed here."

New this year is a free dance party after the Friday night concert. Beginning at 10 p.m. in the Student Center ballroom, members of the visiting Peruvian dance

company will demonstrate popular Latino dances and encourage everyone to join in. Refreshments will be served.

José Feghali and **John Owings** will perform at concerts during this year's festival and special guests coming from South America include:

TCU has plans to involve more organizations from the arts and Hispanic communities in North Texas in the events surrounding future Latin American Music Festivals on campus. According to Germán, "We would like to expand into a Latin American Arts Festival, drawing in painters and sculptors as well as musicians and dancers." He envisions a day when local museums, theaters, movie houses and restaurants will partner with the University to host the region's premier celebration of Latino culture.
