Race chairman was Rozanne Rosenthal who chartered the Tarrant County affiliate of The Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation in 1992. Mrs. Rosenthal and her husband Billy want to let those involved from TCU know how grateful and appreciative they are, both for the quick response and wonderful cooperation they received here. "All I had to do was say I needed a pair of scissors and one would magically appear," Mrs. Rosenthal remarked.

A record 14,000 people, many of whom were breast cancer survivors, were signed up for the race which raised more than \$750,000 for breast cancer research and education.
