## Elie Wiesel is this year's Gates of Chai lecturer

NOBEL LAUREATE AND HOLOCAUST survivor Elie Wiesel will be the featured speaker for the 3rd Annual Gates of Chai Lectureship, according to event organizer **Diane Cooper** of Brite Divinity School. The event will be at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 20 in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

Topic of Wiesel's lecture will be *The Seduction and Dangers of Fanaticism*. Tickets will go on sale in late summer, with an ample number available for faculty, staff and students. Faculty are encouraged to integrate Wiesel's visit into their coursework.

Born in Romania in 1928, Wiesel achieved fame as a writer by drawing on his own experiences and personal testament of the destruction of Jews during World War II. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for Peace in 1986.

Central themes in his fiction, memoirs and essays are "man's inhumanity toward man" and silence versus verbosity. Wiesel is said to represent the conscience of Jewish people throughout the world. ♦
