# Samuel Deitz from Georgia State chosen as dean of the School of Education

TCU NAMED DR. SAMUEL M. DEITZ, DEAN of the College of Education and professor of education and psychology at Georgia State University (GSU), as the new dean of the School of Education. **Chancellor Michael A.** Ferrari announced that Deitz will begin his term at TCU August 1, 2000.

During Deitz's 19-year tenure at GSU, the College of Education saw increases in both external funding and student enrollment. As dean, Deitz formed vital internal partnerships with other disciplines across the campus, resulting in programs that impacted the business community, the university and public schools in Georgia. One such partnership between the College of Education and the College of Arts and Sciences focused on preparing university students to teach subjects related to arts and sciences by immersing them more deeply into the content and teaching styles of the field during their college years. The program, one of the first of its kind in the nation, was subsequently used as a model by other universities.

Deitz also was instrumental in the development of a conflict resolution training program, formed as a result of another internal partnership between the College of Education and the College of Law. The program was implemented in public schools to teach students and teachers appropriate methods of defusing difficult situations.

Prior to being named dean at GSU, Deitz served as acting dean (1990-1992) and chair of the educational foundations department (1984-1990). He also taught at the University of Florida and as a high school English teacher. Deitz earned his Ph.D. and M.A. in Educational Psychology and his B.A. in English and Education from the University of Florida. He is a member of the American Psychological Association and American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, and has served as the president of the Georgia Association for Behavior Analysis, and a guest reviewer for American Psychologist. As a researcher, Deitz has published numerous national and international articles on behavior modification in the classroom in primary, secondary and higher education.

"I think I speak for everyone at TCU that had the opportunity to have conversations

with Sam, that we were very impressed with his knowledge, experience and grasp of the issues facing education today," said **Dr. William H. Koehler**, provost and vice chancellor of academic affairs. "I am personally excited about the opportunity to work with and learn from him."

Although Deitz is well aware of the challenges that lie ahead for the field of education, namely overcrowding in the classrooms and the dwindling numbers of prepared teachers, he feels viable solutions are just around the corner.

"I hope to use my experience in creating innovative partnerships to complement the work already under way at TCU in urban education and math, science and technology education to improve the quality of teachers for our schools," said Deitz. "I am confident the faculty is ready to reach for and grasp a level of national distinction."

The School of Education is comprised of two departments, Educational Foundations and Administration and Curriculum and Instruction. The school also contains two special education laboratory schools, Starpoint, a primary school that works with students diagnosed with mild learning disabilities, and The Rise School, a newly established preschool for children ages 18 months to 5 years old with Down syndrome. The school also houses the Institute for Mathematics, Science and Technology Education, and an Urban Education Initiative, as well as the TRIO Programs. The School of Education has 32 full time faculty and a superintendent-in-residence, Dr. Thomas Tocco, superintendent of the Fort Worth Independent School District.
