Here's a chance to host an incoming international student, if only for a few days

WHEN JOHN SINGLETON, DIRECTOR OF international students services, sent out a campus-wide e-mail last week, it was met with two kinds of responses.

He sent the message to ask TCU faculty and staff to consider opening their homes to arriving international students who have no place to live until the residence halls open. To date, John has received replies from at least seven willing volunteers but he also received even more requests for housing from faculty in touch with still more incoming international students.

John says there are approximately 100 new international students enrolling for fall, bringing the total international enrollment to 500.

"Several people have asked me about involvement with international students but they were worried about long term-committments," John explains. "Here's everyone's opportunity...We need the TCU community to open their homes to these students during the first couple of weeks they're here — long enough to allow them to find apartments and get oriented to a new country and a new University."

Hao Brown (workers compensation) jumped at the chance to provide temporary housing for this emergency situation. "This is one way for a student to learn that America is not what they've seen on television," she says, noting she is anxious to share Fort Worth culture and history with a newcomer. Hao herself immigrated here from Vietnam 25 years ago and is married to a native Texan. She wants their two young daughters to learn about foreign cultures and to be aware of diversity.

Mike Sacken (education) and his wife, Mary Alice, have long considered having an international student live with them for a semester, or a year, but not until their son graduates from high school. This is just the chance they needed to "experiment with the notion of opening our home to a stranger," says Mike. A longtime volunteer counselor at Frog Camp, Mike knows a lot about the transition issues facing new students and feels that those facing international students must be even more complex.

He also looks forward to the reciprocal learning that is inevitable. "I'm going to learn

something about a place I'll probably never visit and certainly never live," Mike says.

John hopes to build a base of people like Hao and Mike within the TCU community. Volunteers will need to provide only these basics:

- Sleeping quarters for a student, even if there's only a couch or futon
- Possibly transportation to and from campus
- One meal per day
- An interest in other cultures and a little free time to spend with the student

"Most international students arrive here without a network," John says. "They don't have bank accounts and they don't have friends they can call." Whether you're the one familiarizing them with the local busline or helping them shop for their new life in Texas, you can make a major impact on how a student adjusts to TCU.

"This is a great opportunity to make a difference in the lives of some students, at a time when they have no one to depend on," says John. "It will require some energy and effort, but the rewards are great."
