TCU LEAPS again Sept. 23: Faculty, staff, students jump into community service

TCU LEAPS, THE UNIVERSITY'S ALL-campus community service effort first organized last spring, will be repeated Sept. 23. Sign-in for the Saturday event will be 9-10 a.m. that day, with buses departing for service sites at 10 a.m. Workers will return to TCU at 2 p.m.

About 400 participated in the TCU LEAPS held April 1. Project coordinator **Marcy Paul** (student development services) notes the goal is to engage faculty and staff in this ongoing effort, working alongside TCU students beyond the borders of the campus. Volunteers may choose between hands-on projects like building, cleaning and painting or people-oriented activities in nursing homes, shelters and recreation centers.

Specific assignments for the upcoming work day range from creating Halloween decorations for "Boo at the Zoo" to building a fence for Habitat for Humanity to visiting with residents of the Bishop Davies Center.

Breakfast, lunch and a T-shirt will be provided for all volunteers. Marcy encourages faculty and staff to bring their spouses and older children to join in the effort. Call ext. 7855 for more information.

ART IN THE METROPLEX OPENED Saturday in the Moudy Exhibition Hall as TCU's contribution to Fort Worth's popular "Gallery Night" activities. The 18th annual juried show will run through Sept. 29.

Twenty-eight works by 21 artists are displayed, including entries from TCU M.F.A. graduates John Frost, Ety Horowitz, Adriana Martinez de Audirac and Janet

Dr. Machado will speak

DAISY L. MACHADO, ASSOCIATE professor of history of Christianity and Hispanic church studies at Brite Divinity School, will give her inaugural address at 11 a.m. Thursday, September 14 in Robert Carr Chapel. Her topic will be *We Are More Than We Seem: History as Imagination*.

Professor Machado received her B.A. degree from Brooklyn College, and an M.S.W. from Hunter College. After earning a Master of Divinity from Union Theological Seminary, she went on to earn a Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago, graduating in 1996.

In 1981 Professor Machado was ordained a minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and was appointed to the Brite faculty in 1999.

The address is free and open to the public. ♦

10-digit dialing begins Oct. 7

BEGINNING OCT. 7, A NEW "682" AREA code will overlay Fort Worth's existing "817" designation. This means that all new phone numbers will be in the "682" area code.

It also means the beginning of 10-digit dialing for anyone placing local phone calls, according to **Darlene Housewright** of business services. As of Oct. 7, anyone who does not dial the area code before a phone number will get a recorded announcement alerting callers of their error.

On Dec. 9, the recorded announcement will be removed and, as numbers are assigned, callers could get a wrong number if the wrong area code is dialed. ♦
