TCU will host national "Dancing with the Mouse" conference Oct. 12-15

UP TO 200 PUBLIC SCHOOL AND university teachers of dance from across the country are expected to attend the upcoming "Dancing with the Mouse: Texas Style" conference Oct. 12-15 on campus. The event is co-sponsored by TCU's department of ballet & modern dance with the National Dance Association and is endorsed by Apple, Inc., Texas Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance.

Teaching dance via interactive CD ROM and software programs ranging from sound editing to choreography are the future of dance training, according to **Keitha Manning**, conference organizer and a member of the TCU dance faculty. "It has been less than 10 years ago that our entire discipline was changed by the possibility of seeing movement on a computer screen," she says. Today's children are so familiar and comfortable with computers that dance teachers who can not or do not utilize technology in their studios may seem less relevant to the media-based lives of dance students, Keitha explains.

"Dance is a visual art and so there are more and more technological materials devoted to motivating dance and exploring movement...within five years, we'll see dance students' resumé's on CD-ROM," she adds. To that end, some upcoming conference sessions will be devoted to copyright laws regarding videography since all aspects of a dancer's performance can have legal ramifications: costumes, musicians, lighting design, even a recognizable location. Those aspiring professional dancers with CD-ROM resumé's will need "a drawer full of copyrights in the future," says Keitha.

"It's a real feather in our cap to have such a high-visibility and important conference on our campus," says **Ellen Page Garrison**, chairman of the department of ballet & modern dance. "It's good for our students, good for our faculty, good for our department and provides high visibility for our university."

Naugle is Green Chair Honors Professor for the ballet department this year. ♦

Interior design joins consortium with schools in Canada, Mexico

THE INTERIOR DESIGN PROGRAM IN the department of design, merchandising & textiles has announced a formal exchange program established between two Canadian and two Mexican universities. The Consortium of Design Education (CODE) is a federally funded program supporting exchange of interior design students across North America. The six universities participating in the exchange are: TCU, West Virginia University, Kwantlen College (Vancouver), Mount Royal College (Calgary), Universidad Autonoma de Guadalajara and Universidad de Guanajuato.

TCU interior design students will study for a semester at the Canadian and Mexican schools over a four-year rotation. Four TCU students will be selected to study at one of the international institutions beginning fall 2001. The interior design program will receive two Mexican and two Canadian students when TCU students are sent out.

In addition to the exchange program, the six institutions plan an annual design charette (a short-term, intensive design

Depression screenings to be offered Thursday

PROFESSIONAL STAFF FROM MENTAL Health Services (formerly the counseling center) will provide students, faculty and staff information about the signs and symptoms of depression Thursday which is National Depression Screening Day.

Anonymous screenings will be offered between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. in the Brown-Lupton Health Center (west entrance on the Stadium Drive side). Participants will complete a written self-report checklist and have the opportunity to discuss the results with a professional. You do not have to schedule an appointment, but the screening will be on a first-come, first-served basis and should take approximately 10 minutes.

Pamphlets about depression, suicide prevention and other information also will be available at tables in the Student Center between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m.

For those unable to participate on Oct. 5, TCU peer counselors will offer a seminar at 9 p.m. Oct. 18 in the Student Center.
