THE TCU ORDER OF OMEGA GREEK honor society will light its annual Christmas tree at 9:30 p.m. Wednesday on the front steps of Sadler Hall. **Chancellor and Mrs. Michael R. Ferrari** will arrive in a sleigh accompanied by Santa and Mrs. Claus.
