



School of Music to offer free lecture series prior to Cliburn Competition

A NEW PREVIEW EVENT LEADING UP TO the 11th Van Cliburn International Piano Competition has been added this spring, in the form of six free, public lectures on campus.

This will be the first year in the history of the Cliburn that Ed Landreth Auditorium will not be a venue for the preliminaries and semi-finals of the prestigious piano event. All aspects of the upcoming Cliburn, set for May 25-June 10, will occur downtown at the Bass Performance Hall. A world tour for the jury to select 30 contestants out of 137 applicants will conclude with a final round of screenings at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. Feb. 21-24 in Ed Landreth. The screening recitals are free and open to the public.

John Giordano, named TCU Distinguished Fellow in Music last spring after his retirement as music director of the Fort Worth Symphony, has organized the upcoming lecture series.

They will be structured as an "insider's guide" to the artistic preparation required for the Cliburn or any world-class musical performance. Dates are 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesdays, beginning April 3 in the Moudy Bldg., Rm. 141N. A member of the TCU music faculty or a TCU music student will perform each week. Speakers and topics include:

APRIL 3

Giordano will introduce the series with brief background on how the competition has developed since 1973 and explain the use of training aids. **José Feghali**, Gold Medal winner at the Seventh Cliburn Competition in 1985 and a member of the TCU faculty, will offer his viewpoint and perform.

APRIL 10

Alann Sampson, chairman of the Competition, will discuss the impact of the event on the local, national and international levels. **Giordano** and **Feghali** will outline concerto performance techniques and the interaction between soloist and conductor.

APRIL 24

Richard Rodzinski, president of the Cliburn Foundation, will cover the philosophy and

relationship of classical music to society in general and the goals and function of the competition relating to this philosophy. **Maria Guralnik**, manager of the Competition, also will speak.

MAY 1

John Owings, Herndon Professor of Piano at TCU, will discuss and demonstrate the proper (and improper) approach to various styles and periods of music, and specific composers. **Owings** and TCU colleagues will demonstrate approaches to chamber music.

MAY 8

Giordano will discuss how jurors are chosen and the composition of that panel, as well as the scoring system. **Tamás Ungár**, director of the TCU/Cliburn Piano Institute, will outline its mission and introduce student performances.

MAY 15

Giordano will delve into programming and repertoire, including the false assumptions that competitors have relative to repertoire. ♦
