Nursing Green Chairs to lead forum on ways to inject "soul" into work

REVIVING AND RETAINING EMPLOYEES through the development of soul-centered workplaces is the focus of an interactive discussion hosted by Harris School of Nursing at 7 p.m., Thursday in Dan Rogers Hall, rm. 134. The event is free and open to the public.

Titled "Leading with Soul/Retaining Employees," the discussion will be co-facilitated by Green Honors Chair Professors Drs. Linda and James Henry of Seattle. The husband-and-wife team are nationally recognized for their work in organizational enhancement and building work teams in health care.

"Retention is as much an issue in the health care field as it is in other fields," says **Carolyn Spence Cagle** (nursing). "Health care organizations must learn to care for their employees in order to create healthy workplaces where employee loyalty results in better patient and customer satisfaction."

The Henrys, who have extensive backgrounds in health care marketing and management consulting, are the co-authors of a recently published book, *Reclaiming Soul in Health Care, Practical Strategies for Revitalizing Providers of Care* and an upcoming book, *The Soul of the Physician, Stories of Passion, Resilience and Hope*.
