



SuperFrog will broaden his social circle with more guest appearances

EVER SINCE SUPERFROG GOT A professional "makeover" a couple of years ago, his star has been on the rise. According to TCU cheerleading coach **Jeff Tucker**, TCU's popular mascot has received increasing numbers of invitations to appear at public events, both on campus and off.

As a result, a new pricing policy has been devised to defray the charges associated with SuperFrog appearances. Booking the mascot for any non-athletic event (Monday at TCU, Programming Council events, parties, etc.) will cost \$45 per hour. Scheduling will be handled through the cheerleading office at ext. 3080. (By Aug. 1, you can find SuperFrog scheduling information by visiting Gofrogs.com).

The new charges will cover paying the SuperFrog suit's human inhabitant for his time, and will provide badly needed funds to keep up with maintenance and repair on the mascot costumes. "The wear and tear on the suit is unbelievable," says Jeff, noting that recent off-the-field gigs have included pre-game alumni events in other cities, Mardi

Gras in New Orleans, out-of-town parades, and community fundraisers like Race for the Cure and the March of Dimes walk.

According to Jeff, the additional funds also will cover the cost of purchasing four more SuperFrog costumes in order to fulfill the additional load of appearance requests. The suits will be re-designed by their original maker, Sugar's of Toronto, to allow the character to be more active and athletic. By streamlining the lizard-like helmet and interior padding of the bodysuit, its wearers can function more like gymnasts ... running, jumping on a mini-trampoline and performing stunts with the TCU cheerleaders.

Currently, says Jeff, there are six students (both male and female) who take turns portraying SuperFrog. The character will introduce his new athletic tricks at the Horned Frogs season opener, the "Pigskin Classic" Aug. 25 at Nebraska, and show off for the home crowd Sept. 15 when TCU takes on Marshall University. ♦

TCU coaches to repeat last year's popular football clinic for women

FIRST-YEAR HEAD FOOTBALL COACH **Gary Patterson** and his coaching staff will offer a football clinic to female football fans from 6 to 8 p.m. Monday, July 23 in the John Justin Athletic Center. TCU's first-ever such clinic last summer drew nearly 200 attendees.

Coaches will provide participants with details and rules about the sport of football, as well as "insider information" on the upcoming season. Three levels of sessions are offered: beginner, intermediate and advanced.

Cost is \$15 per person, with proceeds benefiting Project Purple, a foundation which provides game tickets to underprivileged children.
