Chancellor Ferrari will present two awards at Convocation Thursday

CHANCELLOR MICHAEL R. FERRARI WILL deliver his annual State of the University address which outlines initiatives for the coming year during Convocation at 11 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 6 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Faculty and administrators in full regalia will lead the colorful procession.

Chancellor Ferrari also will present the Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Research or Creative Activity.

Nominees are eight faculty members who already have received their School and College awards this year: **Spencer K. Wertz** (AddRan College/Humanities), **Charles Lockhart** (AddRan College/Social Sciences), **Ranga Ramasesh** (M.J. Neeley School of Business), **Ralph R. Behnke** (College of Communication), **Cecilia Silva** (School of Education), **Babette Bohn** (College of Fine Arts), **Linda S. Moore** (College of Health and Human Sciences) and **John G. Albright** (College of Science and Engineering).

The Wassenich Award for Mentoring in the TCU Community will be presented to a member of the faculty or staff in recognition and celebration of this person's mentoring of students. The honor was created in 1999 through an endowment established by TCU alumni Mark and Linda Wassenich of Dallas. Because of their own rich experiences as TCU students, the couple founded the unique mentoring award to highlight the value TCU places on key relationships with faculty and staff which help students develop, succeed

and contribute to their communities.

This year's finalists are: **Richard Allen** (RTVF), **Joanne Green** (political science), **Doug Newsom** (journalism), **Mike Russel** (campus life), **Mike Sacken** (School of Education), **Peggy Watson** (Spanish & Latin American Studies) and **Steve Weis** (engineering).

University organist **Joe Butler** will play, and the Concert Chorale will perform, under the direction of **Ronald Shirey**, along with the Wind Symphony Brass Choir, conducted by **Bobby Francis**. **Richard Estes** will lead the singing of the *alma mater*; University minister **John L. Butler** will deliver the invocation and the benediction. **Provost Bill Koehler** will introduce the awards.

As long as offices are covered, all faculty, staff and students are encouraged to attend.

Celebration on the Lawn will begin as soon as Convocation lets out, on the lawn between Sadler and Reed, with party tents and refreshments. Music will be provided by the TCU Jazz Combo, under the direction of **Curt Wilson**.

The celebration offers an opportunity for faculty, students and all staff members to kick off TCU's 129th year together in an informal, festive atmosphere. In the event of rain, the lawn event will be moved to the Student Center ballroom. ♦

Goodbye Mr. Chips (1939) Robert Donat is a reserved but lovable schoolmaster and Greer Garson is the woman who changes his life in this romantic depiction of Britain in the early 20th century.

Gentlemen's Agreement (1947) Gregory Peck stars as a writer investigating anti-Semitism. Strong performances by Peck, Celeste Holm, John Garfield, Dorothy McGuire and Anne Revere.

Sept. 20

Gone With the Wind (1939) The Hollywood classic—need we say more? Introductory remarks begin at 6:45 p.m.; movie begins at 7 p.m. and runs four hours.

Sept. 27

Leave Her to Heaven (1946) A beautiful, willful woman (Gene Tierney) marries a writer (Cornell Wilde) who is unprepared for her jealousy. Also with Jeanne Crain and Vincent Price.

A Tree Grows in Brooklyn (1945) A sensitive girl (Peggy Ann Garner) grows up in early 20th-century New York. The excellent supporting cast includes James Dunn, Dorothy McGuire and Joan Blondell. (2 hours 10 minutes).

Forever Amber (1947) Adventure! Romance! Linda Darnell contends with numerous love interests, the Great Fire of London, and George Sanders as Charles II (2 hours 20 minutes).

Oct. 18

Guys and Dolls (1955) Marlon Brando, Frank Sinatra and Jean Simmons star in this adaptation of the Broadway classic about

gamblers and dames in New York. The movie also features Vivian Blaine, Stubby Kaye and spectacular songs (2 hours 30 minutes).

Oct. 25

Comedy Cavalcade A program of non-stop laughs: short films starring Buster Keaton and Charlie Chaplin, followed by the Marx Brothers' feature *Duck Soup* (1933).

Nov. 1

Rear Window (1954) Photographer James Stewart looks out his apartment window to pass the time—and believes he witnesses a murder. Grace Kelly, Thelma Ritter, Wendell Corey and Raymond Burr also star.

Nov. 8

The Snake Pit (1948) Olivia DeHavilland portrays a woman institutionalized after a nervous breakdown. Leo Genn and Celeste Holm also star in this breakthrough film, one of Hollywood's first serious efforts to depict mental illness.

Nov. 15

Million Dollar Mermaid (1952) This biography of Australian swimmer Annette Kellerman provides a perfect opportunity for Esther Williams and choreographer Busby Berkeley to produce some spectacular water ballets. Also starring Victor Mature and Walter Pidgeon.
