THEATRE TCU PRESENTS *LA LLORONA* Sept. 26-30 in Hays Theatre. The drama, set in Mexico City in the early 1990s, was written by Kathleen Milne, a graduate of Brigham Young University who is currently working on a second degree and doing graduate work at TCU.

La Llorona is the story of a young Mexican couple struggling to hold onto their family home and their dignity in the wake of NAFTA. *Be Boyd* (theater) is directing the nine-member cast.

Gardening tip from physical plant: Lightly prune and fertilize heat-stressed geraniums and begonias to rejuvenate. Prepare beds for spring flower bulbs, using generous amounts of organic matter to improve drainage.
