American Airlines Leadership for the Americas Congress set for Oct. 7 - 12

FIFTY-FIVE STUDENTS FROM 11 universities in North, Central and South America will visit campus next week when TCU hosts the Second Annual American Airlines Leadership for the Americas Congress Oct. 7-12.

The event, being held for the first time on U.S. soil, unites 55 students annually to exchange perspectives about the issues and problems common to the Western Hemisphere. The inaugural congress convened on the campus of Universidad de las Americas (UDLA) last fall in Pueblo, Mexico. TCU and UDLA are the founders and administrators of the program.

This year students will discuss topics such as education, environment, science and technology, and sustainable development. Four Nobel Peace Prize Laureates will also join the summit: Oscar Arias, the former President of Costa Rica, Jody Williams, known for her work banning landmines, Adolfo Perez Esquivel, recognized for his campaign against Latin American military regimes, and Norman Borlaug, a leader in

the agricultural revolution in Central America. Each will participate in seminars with students throughout the week.

The laureates also will participate in a free, public forum entitled "An Evening with the Nobels - Peace Prize Laureates from the Americas" Oct. 11 at 7:30 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

A special musical event by the TCU Symphony Orchestra honoring the AALA Congress is slated for 7:30 p.m. Oct. 9 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. **Germán Gutiérrez** will conduct the program which includes Mozart's *Symphony No. 25 in G Minor*, Mousorgsky/Ravel's *Pictures at an Exhibition* and the medley *Rapsodia Latinoamericana*. The concert is free and open to the public.

TCU United Way campaign begins on campus next week

THE UNIVERSITY IS LAUNCHING ITS 2001 United Way Campaign with an announced goal of \$108,000, a 3.3 percent increase over last year's total of \$104,000. The effort begins Monday, Oct. 8 and continues for two weeks.

This year's campus United Way Campaign chair is **Mike Mattson** (advancement), assisted by **Mary Wenzell**, campus campaign coordinator. They are scheduling meetings for every area of campus, where faculty and staff will have an opportunity to view the United Way video and receive pledge forms and information about the many services provided.

"This campaign is especially critical for the United Way of Metropolitan Tarrant County," according to Mike. "Because of the attacks in New York and Washington, D.C., many

people are directing their charitable contributions to these areas, where the need undoubtedly is great. But we should also remember the many people in our own community who depend upon the United Way. In fact, as a result of the attacks, a growing number of Fort Worth area residents have lost their jobs and will need the services that United Way provides."

For the first time, it will be possible to make your pledge online. Watch for an e-mail message from United Way explaining the process and instructing users how to access the online donation form. TCU employees have several options. They may select the payroll deduction method, credit card, cash or check or use the form to request billing from United Way.

"Over the past two years, we have trained 75 faculty/staff to recognize and respond to the immediate risk of suicide in our community," says Monica Kintigh.

"This workshop is being offered free because we believe that the person who is in the best position to respond to someone in crisis is the one they are talking to. ASIST is designed to help us all become more comfortable, competent and confident when dealing with persons at risk."
