United Way campus campaign exceeds goal by \$21,000; retirees generous donors

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THIS YEAR'S UNITED Way campus campaign total \$129,718 in pledges from 643 donors. And donations are continuing to trickle in, according to **Mike Mattson**, assistant vice chancellor for leadership gifts and the University's United Way Campaign chair this year.

The unprecedented amount far surpasses the announced goal of \$108,000. Last year, the total received was \$104,000.

"In these challenging economic times, members of the TCU family reached deep in their pockets to help other members of the Tarrant County community who are in need," Mike says. "We are grateful for their generous spirit, which took us thousands of dollars beyond our goal and will provide much-needed assistance in the uncertain months ahead."

Mike also notes that more than \$20,000 of the total was received from 52 retired faculty and staff. ♦

R.A.D. is a comprehensive program of realistic, self-defense tactics and techniques for women, beginning with awareness, prevention, risk reduction and avoidance, and progressing to the basics of hands-on defense training.

Mammogram screening unit to be on campus Dec. 11-12

THE HARRIS METHODIST FORT WORTH

Doris Kupferle Mobile Mammography Screening Unit will be parked at the Student Center for two days next month. Hours are 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 11 and 11 a.m.-6 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 12.

A screening mammogram is a low dose x-ray of the breast that is proven effective in the early detection of breast cancer. To be eligible, women should be 35 or older with no known breast problems or personal history of breast cancer. They also should not be pregnant or breastfeeding.

United HealthCare members, Medicaid, Medicare or private health insurance will be billed. There is no charge for women with low income, although financial guidelines must be met and an application submitted to qualify.

Appointments are required; call 1-888-442-7747. The entire screening visit takes less than 15 minutes and is provided in the comfortable mobile center, specifically designed for mammography and breast education. ♦


