Jan. 24

Notorious (1946) Spy Cary Grant recruits woman-with-a-past Ingrid Bergman to investigate suspected Nazis in South America, pushing her into the clutches of Claude Rains and his nefarious mother.

Jan. 31

The Miracle Worker (1962) Young Helen Keller—blind, deaf, and mute since infancy—seems a lost cause, until teacher Annie Sullivan finds a way to communicate with her. Patty Duke and Anne Bancroft earned Oscars for their riveting performances in this inspiring film based on true events.

Feb. 7

Mr. Smith Goes to Washington (1939) James Stewart stars as an idealist who takes on political corruption in the U.S. Senate. This Frank Capra favorite also stars Jean Arthur, Claude Rains and Thomas Mitchell. (This film runs 129 minutes.)

Feb. 14

Love is a Many Splendored Thing (1955) The romance between war correspondent William Holden and Eurasian doctor Jennifer Jones is complicated by political events and the intolerance of family and friends.

Feb. 21

Mildred Pierce (1945) Joan Crawford won an Oscar for her portrayal of a woman who achieves success in the restaurant business, but whose personal life is a shambles. A weak but jealous husband, a shallow lover, a social-climbing daughter and an ambitious business partner—of course, the result must be murder—but is Mildred to blame? Ann Blythe, Jack Carson, Eve Arden and Zachary Scott also star.

March 7

Destination Tokyo (1943) A U.S. submarine embarks on a secret mission to the very shores

of Japan, its crew dealing with the pressures of war, interpersonal conflicts—and an emergency appendectomy. Cary Grant, John Garfield and Alan Hale star. (This film runs 136 minutes.)

March 21

National Velvet (1945) A young Elizabeth Taylor believes that she can win the Grand National Steeplechase with her beloved horse, Pie, and enlists the help of jockey Mickey Rooney to prepare. Anne Revere and Donald Crisp are among the outstanding supporting cast.

March 28

Gentlemen Prefer Blondes (1953) Lounge singers Marilyn Monroe and Jane Russell seek romance and financial security in this musical comedy set on a trans-Atlantic cruise.

April 4

Johnny Guitar (1954) Joan Crawford runs a saloon, Mercedes McCambridge the local bank—and both are in love with Sterling Hayden, so there's bound to be trouble.

April 11

Vera Cruz (1954) Burt Lancaster and Gary Cooper are mercenaries in Mexico, hired to escort a lovely lady and a shipment of gold for the Emperor Maximilian. Shifting loyalties and a series of double-crosses lead to a dramatic confrontation between the two friends. This film is part of the week-long TCU Latin American Arts Festival.

April 18

Diabolique (1954 - French w/English subtitles) The wife and mistress of a sadistic schoolteacher conspire to kill him, but things don't go exactly as planned in this much-copied (and recently re-made) thriller. Simone Signoret and Vera Clouzot star in this genuinely suspenseful and atmospheric film.

April 25

Witness for the Prosecution (1957)
Tyrone Power stands accused of murder—
and the testimony of his wife (Marlene
Dietrich) may send him to the gallows.
Charles Laughton plays his shrewd lawyer
and Elsa Lanchester is a persistent nurse
trying to coddle Laughton after his recent
heart attack.

E-Business program wants non-profits for students to create free Web design

A SPRING SEMESTER PROJECT involving 70 senior E-Business students will result in upgraded or new Web sites for 12 Tarrant County non-profit organizations who sign up for the project by the end of the month.

Five non-profits have expressed interest so far, but **Meenu Singh**, an assistant professor of management information systems and e-business and faculty advisor for the project, wants to recruit more.

"We hope to get 14 to 15 agencies interested in the project," says Meenu. "The students participating in this project are experienced designers, and many have already had Web design internships at corporations like RadioShack, Bell Helicopter Textron and TXU."

The Web site designs are more than just cosmetic. Students also will develop applications that will increase the functionality of the sites, such as enabling them to link to various internal and external databases.

Women's Resource Center announces research award

TCU STUDENTS AND FACULTY engaged in research pertaining to women's issues are invited to apply for the Nokia Research Award. A \$500 stipend will be presented to one student and one faculty member at the Women and Community Dinner March 5, during the eighth annual Women's Symposium. Nokia, Inc. sponsors this award.

Deadline for applications is 5 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 7. The faculty recipient will be selected on the basis of a written proposal defining the research project and explaining how it will contribute to scholarly understanding of women's issues. A student (undergraduate or graduate) will be chosen on the basis of academic performance and potential, a written proposal and two recommendations from faculty members.

Fraternities and sororities raise funds for Rise School

TCU STUDENTS FROM 20 DIFFERENT Greek organizations launched a six-weeklong, intensive fundraising effort to establish a \$25,000 endowment that will fund scholarships for children at TCU's Rise School. The School, an early intervention preschool for Down syndrome children 18 months to 5 years old, will grant the first \$1,250 scholarship from the Interfraternity (IFC) and Panhellenic Council Endowed Scholarship Fund for the Rise School in fall 2002.

"We wanted the scholarships to be available to Rise students by fall 2002, which meant we had to quickly raise the endowment money and turn it in by Dec. 31," said Kyle Gore, former IFC president. They accomplished their goal through car washes, furniture sales and individual donations. "Each fraternity and sorority raised about \$1,000 and the Panhellenic Council and IFC contributed the rest," according to Kyle.

Kathy Cooter, director of Rise School, notes the scholarship assistance is greatly needed since many Rise parents are in their early 20s and often face tremendous medical bills because of their children's condition.

"The Rise School offers occupational and other forms of therapy that go beyond what a normal preschool would offer, so expenses are higher," said Kathy. "This scholarship endowment will enable us to provide money for scholarships for students every year for many years to come."



Professor Bob Frye is well-known for many reasons, and in many circles. In fact, during his 35-year career at TCU Dr. Frye has had so many achievements and made such an impact that it's difficult to figure out which measuring stick to use. He has won the top on-campus awards (Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Teaching in 1992, a Mortar Board Preferred Professor more than once, Honors Faculty Recognition Award in 1981). He also has garnered even weightier national attention (Carnegie Foundation's Texas Professor of the Year in 1996, a Piper Professor in 1994, editorial space devoted to his unique teaching style in *The New York Times* and *The Chronicle of Higher Education*).

"Bob sets the standard of integrity for our department and is a compass for us all," says Richard Enos of the English faculty. "He is a fine teacher and researcher, always focused on what's best for the students and the University but also regarded as a national expert within our discipline and across it as well. Bob may be the best representative of what TCU stands for," Richard continues.

Bob has recently (and quietly, as is his custom) announced that he will retire from full-time teaching at the end of 2002.
