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Former Prime Minister of Pakistan Benazir Bhutto to speak at TCU April 18

FORMER PRIME MINISTER OF PAKISTAN Benazir Bhutto will give a public lecture April 18 on the TCU campus titled "Choices to be Made by the Muslim World." The event, made possible by a gift from The Frost Foundation, will begin at 7:30 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

Bhutto, one of a handful of female executive leaders of the last century, became the first female elected prime minister in the Muslim world at age 35. Exiled, imprisoned and deposed twice from her position, Bhutto continues to travel the world speaking about the need for democratic reform and improved human rights in Pakistan.

Two-hundred fifty free tickets will be available to TCU faculty, staff and students with a valid TCU ID at the Student Center desk, beginning at 8 a.m. Wednesday, March 20. The tickets are first-come, first-served, and are limited to one per person.

General admission tickets for \$15 each will be available exclusively online at www.ticketweb.com or by phone toll-free at 866-468-7621. Faculty and staff also are welcome to attend a student forum with Ms. Bhutto at 3 p.m. in the Kelly Center (limited seating). ♦

Brite lecture series will bring experts on Latino religions to campus

BRITE DIVINITY SCHOOL WILL SOON inaugurate a lecture series titled "Borderlands Intersections: Faith and Culture." Its purpose is to examine those points of intersection between the Latino and the Euro-American religious communities.

According to **Daisy Machado** (Brite), who is overseeing the project, the 2000 census figures show that 32% of the Texas population is Latino, a number somewhere above six million residents. "We want to make sure we create a space to examine and discuss the religious dimension of the Latino community," Daisy says. "To help us do this, we are inviting well-known Latino theologians, theological ethicists, missiologists and sociologists of religion from around the U.S. to share with us their scholarship and insights."

The first lecture will be at 7 p.m. Monday, April 15 at the Kelly Center. Speaker will be Dr. Carlos Cardoza-Orlandi, a missiologist

Bill Watrous, Shelly Berg Trio here for Jazz Festival

JAZZ TROMBONIST BILL WATROUS AND the Shelly Berg Trio will spend the weekend at TCU, helping to train aspiring young musicians during the day and blowing audiences out of their seats at concerts each night. This is the 25th anniversary year for jazz director **Curt Wilson's** campus Jazz Festival, which has a rich history of bringing in the greats in the field to perform alongside the University's own talented jazz ensembles.

The Festival also will be this year's featured production of the TCU Fine Arts Guild, making it a scholarship fundraiser for the College of Fine Arts and the College of Communication.

The Friday night concert with the Shelly Berg Trio featuring Bill Watrous will be at 7:30 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Admission is \$6.

All day Saturday, 28 area high school and middle school jazz ensembles will attend workshops and perform in Ed Landreth Auditorium and PepsiCo Recital Hall. Admission is free to anyone wishing to sit in on the session.

Watrous made a name for himself performing with Woody Herman, Roy Eldridge and Count Basie. Considered one of the greatest trombone virtuosos of all time, he was voted *Downbeat Magazine* readers' choice for "Number One Jazz Trombonist" seven years in a row. Admission to that event is \$12.

A PIECE OF SCULPTURE TITLED "L'ENTRE Deux Anneaux" (Between Two Rings) and created by artist Bernard Ney of Luxembourg has been given to TCU by the Embassy of Luxembourg. It will be displayed in the lobby of Mary Coats Burnett Library.

The gift was dedicated last week during a ceremony attended by the Luxembourg ambassador to the U.S., Mrs. Arlett Conzemious Paccourd. The library houses an extensive Luxembourg book collection started many years ago by the late Aggie Pate and his wife, Joyce, now Mrs. Robert Capper. **Dr. James Newcomer**, former vice chancellor of TCU, purchased most of the items for the library on buying trips to Europe funded by the Pates. Mrs. Capper continues to provide funds each year to acquire new materials.

Dr. and Mrs. Capper and Dr. Newcomer attended the dedication, followed by a luncheon in the Chancellor's dining room, hosted by **Larry Adams** (associate provost for academic affairs). ♦
