## Trustees hear TCU vision, elect three new trustees at spring meeting

TCU CAN CREATE AND NOURISH THE ideal university experience by 2010, Chancellor Michael R. Ferrari told the TCU Board of Trustees today during the board's spring meeting. Dr. Ferrari outlined his strategic vision for the university around four imperatives:

- Provide a superior undergraduate experience
  - Strengthen centers of excellence
- Offer greater service to the region, nation and world
- Create a dramatic campus landscape that reflects a commitment to excellence

"(In 2010) 'The TCU Experience,' more than ever before, will continue to be transforming for the students and those who teach and mentor them," said Ferrari. "This is our time to move forward with courage, judgment, integrity and dedication to build an even more distinguished university, a place where students can be assured of that elusive ideal university experience."

Ferrari also presented a robust admissions report to the board, citing a record enrollment (7,428) for the spring semester and a successful recruiting campaign for the fall class. More than 6,000 applications were received for the incoming freshman class of 1,475 (a planned decrease from last year's freshman class of 1,514).

The trustees elected Dr. John W. Long, Vernell Sturns and S. Patrick Woodson III as Trustee Emeriti; re-elected the eight members of the class of 2002 to four-year terms; and elected three new trustees to four-year terms expiring in 2006. The new trustees are:

- Brenda A. Cline '82 secretarytreasurer and chief administrative officer of the Kimbell Art Foundation who received her BBA in accounting
- Lou Hill Davidson '64 civic volunteer in Washington D.C. who received her BS in elementary education
- J. Roger Williams '72 chairman of Roger Williams Chrysler/Plymouth/ Dodge/ Jeep auto dealership in Weatherford who received his BSEd. in physical education

In other business, the board:

- Heard a presentation by Chelsea Hudson, president of the Student Government Association, who presented the recommendations of the students for campus and curriculum improvements;
  - Heard from Dr. Sam Dietz, dean of the

school of education, on his vision for facilities and centers of excellence needed for the school to develop effective, ethical educators;

- Listened to thoughts on ethical leadership and TCU's mission and opportunity in global higher education from Rev. Norman Drummond, chairman of the board of Columba 1400, a highly regarded community and international leadership center on the Isle of Skye in Scotland (Drummond was the winter commencement speaker);
- Re-elected the current officers of the board and university;
- Accepted the endorsement of the athletics committee to establish women's softball at TCU, and asked the administration to review plans for a timetable, facilities and budget with the fiscal affairs and buildings and grounds committees of the board;
- Passed a resolution honoring Robert D. Krebs for his service to the board and TCU: and
- Approved faculty promotion, tenure and emeritus recommendations.

The trustees will meet again in November 2002. ◆

## Anantha Babbili will discuss media violence at upcoming symposium

UNIVERSITY CHRISTIAN CHURCH AND Cook Children's Medical Center will cosponsor a symposium on media violence from 9:15 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Saturday, April 20 at UCC. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. for those who've not pre-registered.

Organizers hope to bring together parents, teachers, health care and social workers, students and faith community members to discuss health and safety issues raised by violent media content.

Cost is \$10 for the general public, \$25 for healthcare professionals (who will receive CEU credit) and free to students.

Keynote speaker will be Anantha Babbili (journalism), who will examine the historical, cultural and economic factors fueling the increase in media violence and how it affects our world view. Dr. Scott Colglazier, senior minister at UCC, will conclude the program with a discussion of the role faith communities can play in responding to violence in the media, the community and the world.
