Don Jackson, Kay Higgins recognized at Convocation

DR. DONALD W. JACKSON, PROFESSOR OF political science here since 1975, received the 2002 Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Teaching during Fall Convocation last week.

Don's gift for and enjoyment of classroom teaching are evidenced in the praise of his nominators. For more than 25 years, he has served as TCU's pre-law advisor, counseling scores of students regarding pre-law, applications to law school and choosing the right law school for them. He also has served for many years as director of the London Centre internship program and coordinator of the Truman Scholarship, which six TCU students have won under his tutelage.

Dr. L. Kay Higgins, director of new student programs, was chosen to receive the 2002 Wassenich Award for Mentoring in the TCU Community. The honor is selected by students, to recognize a member of the faculty or staff who has made a significant difference as mentor in the lives of students. Mark and Linda Wassenich of Dallas, TCU alumni who established the award in 1999 in appreciation for the mentoring they received as students, were in the audience at Ed Landreth Auditorium.

Kay has been on staff at TCU since 1978, filling positions ranging from graduate housing coordinator to overseeing residential living to director of the Women's Resource Center. Her work, both with new students and those who have gone on to become OSAs and Frog Camp facilitators, personifies the definition of "mentoring," according to young people whose lives she's touched. ♦

Gardening tip from Robert Sulak in physical plant: Caladiums require plenty of water at this time of year. Fertilize with ammonium sulfate at the rate of 1/3 to 1/2 pound per 100 square feet of bed area, and water thoroughly.
