"Speaking of Women's Health" to be held on campus Nov. 2

"SPEAKING OF WOMEN'S HEALTH," A popular day-long forum held annually in Dallas, will debut in Fort Worth Nov. 2 in the Student Center. Hundreds are expected to attend the 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. symposium designed to educate women about health, well-being and personal safety.

Sponsors are KERA, Harris Methodist Hospitals and the TCU Women's Resource Center.

Keynote speakers will be authors Mary Marcdante and Paula Statman. Twenty breakout sessions, led by area doctors, healthcare professionals and nutritional experts, will cover topics ranging from cancer to menopause, anxiety to cosmetic surgery.

lose interest in during elementary years.

Children will use their own "catalog" of 25 workshops to register for six (three first choice and three alternate), 50-minute, hands-on classes.

"The popularity of this program shows kids really do have a desire to learn more about subjects like math and science," said **Janet Kelly**, assistant professor of education and director of the School of Education's Institute of Math, Science and Technology.

After arriving on campus, the students will receive a packet confirming class schedules and take TCU student-led tours to locate their classrooms, some of which will be held in the new Tucker Technology Center. Parents will attend sessions taught by **Don Dansereau** (psychology), who will speak about children's learning processes. A TCU admissions officer will explain the college admissions process.

The mini-university also serves as a practice teaching experience for the School of Education's pre-service teachers, those less than a year from graduation, who design and implement many of the

New options for tickets to basketball, baseball

TCU FACULTY AND STAFF ARE currently able to purchase a reserved season ticket for football for \$50 and, in addition, receive a general admission pass to all other on-campus athletic events. This option will remain in place for those wishing to purchase under this plan.

Athletics has recently created a second option to give faculty and staff the opportunity to purchase reserved season tickets at men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball games, in addition to the football reserved season ticket option already offered. This option is offered to better meet the needs of those wishing to have a reserved seat at these events. This option is available, as the current one is, to all those family members living in the household of a faculty/staff member. The details:

Football Reserved Season Ticket - \$50
Men's Basketball Reserved Season Ticket - \$50

Women's Basketball Reserved Season Ticket - \$50

Baseball Reserved Season Ticket - \$50

If three of the above four reserved season ticket packages are purchased, the fourth package is free. For example, if you purchase football, men's basketball and women's basketball reserved season tickets,

the baseball season ticket is free.

This option also was created in anticipation of future sell-out games where general admission pass holders may be turned away, if general admission sections are full. This option gives faculty and staff the opportunity to purchase a reserved seat for non-football venues at a significantly reduced price.
