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IBR among seven research centers nationwide in five-year study of prison drug use

TCU'S INSTITUTE OF BEHAVIORAL Research (IBR) has been named by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) as one of seven new national research centers providing science-based guidance on the most effective ways to deliver treatment for incarcerated offenders with substance abuse problems. This is the first time NIDA has established a network of research centers to study addiction problems within the U.S. criminal justice system.

Called the Criminal Justice Drug Abuse Treatment Studies (CJ-DATS), the five-year project funded by NIDA will examine key elements of prison-based treatment systems in the U.S. and study ways to enhance outcomes and improve overall efficiency of treatment delivery.

"We are seeking better ways of addressing the needs of drug-involved offenders," says **Dwayne Simpson**, director of IBR and principal investigator for CJ-DATS studies at TCU. "Our previous research has shown that effective offender treatment involves the successful completion of sequential components across time, beginning with primary treatment within prison walls, followed by structured half-way houses and outpatient treatment upon release, and long-term aftercare services beyond that."

IBR will partner with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) to focus on drug treatment approaches within the state's criminal justice system. Texas has one of the largest correction-based treatment systems in the country, with over 12,000 prisoners in some type of drug treatment program at any given time. Nationally, three out of four inmates have a history of illegal drug use, but fewer than 20 percent get any type of treatment while incarcerated.

"This type of comprehensive research strategy will provide evidence-based guidelines for delivering effective and efficient drug treatment in correctional settings, from prison to community-based settings. These studies, and their counterparts nationally, have the potential to shift public opinion toward optimism for successful recovery of drug-addicted offenders," according to Dwayne.

Other research centers for the CJ-DATS study include the University of California-Los Angeles (UCLA), Brown University, University

of Connecticut, University of Delaware, University of Kentucky, and the National Development and Research Institutes (NDRI). The University of Maryland will assist as a coordinating center. A dozen state correctional systems (including TDCJ) will serve as research sites.

NIDA, part of the National Institutes of Health, funds over 85 percent of all drug treatment research conducted worldwide. ♦
