TCU Press will host annual Autograph Extravaganza to showcase authors, books

READERS AND CHRISTMAS SHOPPERS ARE invited to visit with authors when TCU Press holds its annual Autograph Extravaganza from 4-7 p.m. Friday, Dec. 6, at the Fort Worth Botanic Garden Center. More than 30 authors will be present to visit and sign their books.

Prudence Mackintosh will speak at 5 p.m. about her new book, Sneaking Out. As a contributor to Texas Monthly, Mackintosh gained a loyal following with her observations on social rites of passage for Texas women and her essays on the rearing of three boys. Her books, Thundering Sneakers and Retreads chronicle her experiences raising her sons. The new title, Sneaking Out, has her observations on the gradual departure of her three sons and parents. In 1996, the University of Texas Press published Just as We Were: A Narrow Slice of Texas Womanhood, a collection of her essays on being a woman in Texas. That press is reissuing her previous books simultaneously with publication of Sneaking Out.
