Faculty honored at recent Commencement ceremony

SIX FACULTY WERE HONORED FOR teaching or research and creative activity at Fall Commencement, Saturday, Dec. 21. The Dean's Awards recognize faculty who have earned excellence in teaching and scholarship. Faculty were nominated and reviewed by fellow faculty, with the final selection made by the academic deans. Each recipient received a \$2,500 cash prize.

Recipients of the 2002 Dean's Teaching Award are **Wayne Barcellona**, associate professor of biology; **Ann George**, assistant professor of English; and **Jennifer Watson**, associate professor of speech and language pathology.

Recipients of the 2002 Dean's Research and Creativity Award are **Richard Allen**, associate professor of radio-TV-film; **Germán Gutiérrez**, associate professor of music; and **Richard Hanson**, professor of geology.

Other nominees for the Teaching Award were **Manochehr Dorraj** (political science); **Anne Helmreich** (art history); **Paul King** (speech communication); **Robert Rhodes** (management); and **Ranae Stetson** (education). Additional nominees for the Research and Creative Activity Award were **Ronald Burns** (criminal justice); **Claudia Camp** (religion); **Ranga Ramasesh** (finance and decision sciences); **Sherrie Reynolds** (education); and **Darryn Willoughby** (kinesiology). ♦

Extended Education courses include new offerings

TCU'S OFFICE OF EXTENDED EDUCATION is currently accepting registrations for its spring courses, which include dance and fitness courses in the new University Recreation Center, as well as ventures in water painting, gospel music, champagne tasting at Botanic Garden and little known facts about the wedding industry.

Fitness courses such as Pilates, jujitsu, and hatha yoga, and dance courses such as Latin dancing and ballroom dancing that were previously relocated off campus because of construction will be held in the soon-to-open Recreation Center. Gardening courses, including a new course on how to plan a garden wedding, will be held at the Fort Worth Botanic Garden.

"We will keep expanding our offerings in order to make sure we're meeting our community's educational and personal needs," said **Julie Lovett**, Extended Education

coordinator of community programs and professional development.

Other new courses include one focused on teaching parents and kids ages 5-10 personal safety and life skills, taught in conjunction with the Fort Worth Crime Prevention Resource Center, and another course on how to run a marathon and enjoy it.

TCU's Office of Extended Education also will continue to offer opportunities to enhance professional skills through computer training, interpersonal skill development, and language courses. Microsoft certification courses will be offered for those seeking to upgrade their job skills in order to pursue new careers or enhance current ones. Command Spanish®, courses designed to teach professionals key Spanish phrases in order to communicate with Spanish-speaking clients in nursing and the manufacturing and warehousing industry, also will be offered.

The majority of classes are held weekday evenings on TCU's main campus, at Fort Worth's Botanic Garden, or at the TCUglobalcenter at Alliance. Classes range in price from \$35 to over \$100, depending upon materials needed for the course. Faculty/staff discounts can be applied to eligible courses.
