



Victor Boschini named Chancellor during Trustees session

DR. VICTOR JOHN BOSCHINI JR., PRESIDENT OF Illinois State University, has been named the 10th chancellor in TCU's 130-year history by the TCU Board of Trustees.

"We believe Dr. Boschini is one of the outstanding young university administrators in America. His people and organizational skills, his record on diversity, and his outreach, including fund raising, were key factors in his selection. We believe his vision and his energy will continue the upward momentum of TCU in virtually every area," said **John V. Roach**, chairman of the Board of Trustees, who made the announcement at a Jan. 30 press conference following a meeting of the full board. Speaking to members of the TCU community who attended, Dr. Boschini expressed his gratitude for the honor and responsibility that is now his.

"I pledge to all of you who are already in this community that I will work my hardest, with vigor and enthusiasm, to make sure that I live up to — no, *exceed* your expectations," he added. In addition to **Chancellor Michael R. Ferrari** and his wife, Jan, audience members included former chancellors **William E. Tucker** and **James M. Moudy** and their wives.

"My wife, Megan, and I are so very excited about becoming a part of the Fort Worth community. Along with our children, Elizabeth, Mary Catherine, Edward Mark and Margaret, we will be moving here for good on June 1. And, as anyone with a large family knows, when we move anywhere we are seen and heard. Our children [ages 7-15] intend to become a very visible and active part of TCU life." Dr. Boschini said.

A native of Cleveland, OH, he received his bachelor's degree from Mount Union College in Ohio in 1978, a master's degree in personnel from Bowling Green University in 1979 and his doctorate in higher education administration from Indiana University in 1989.

Also at last week's winter meeting, Trustees approved a 2003-2004 budget of \$230 million. In his report to the board, Dr. Ferrari presented an operating and capital budget plan that focuses on four priorities - academic excellence, faculty and staff compensation, supporting students and their life goals, and supporting campus administrative functions, new facilities and infrastructure.

"This budget is one that sustains the momentum of the university, provides healthy reserves to address economic uncertainty,

maintains discipline in endowment management, and provides new money in select areas that enhance distinctive academic strengths," said Dr. Ferrari.

Some of the highlighted initiatives in the 2003-04 budget include vital

increases for student financial aid and the Community Scholars program, the fulfillment of parity in the retirement contribution for nonexempt staff, a strengthened and expanded Career Center, staffing and maintenance for the myriad of new facilities opening in 2002-03, deferred, reallocated or reduced expenses of \$1.6 million, and the final phase of the three-year, \$30 million upgrade to classrooms and laboratories across campus.

TCU will remain among the lowest-priced private, comprehensive doctoral universities in the Southwest, according to Ferrari. The board approved an annual tuition for 2003-04 of \$17,630, a 7.9% adjustment over the current tuition of \$16,340.

Chancellor Ferrari's report also included positive news for spring enrollment and student recruitment. Twelfth-day

enrollment for the spring semester is 7,585, a 2% increase over last year. Applications for the 2003-04 freshman class have already eclipsed last year's record. To date, more than 6,300 applications, including a 60% increase in applications from students of color, have been received for 1,525 positions (6,100 total applications were received last year). ♦
