Sounds of 1,000 trumpets will blast campus at ITG Conference this week

UP TO 1,000 TRUMPET ARTISTS FROM around the globe are expected to attend the 28th annual International Trumpet Guild Conference on campus until Saturday. Daily events include recitals, master classes, lectures and panel discussions, as well as public concerts by some of the world's leading brass musicians.

The lineup of performers includes:

- Phil Driscoll, gospel recording artist

- Jouko Harjanne, UCLA professor and former member of the Canadian Brass

- Scotty Blanchard, solo trumpet with the Count Basie Orchestra and jazz educator
- Jon Lewis, L.A. studio trumpet player

- Ensemble de Trompettes de Lyon
- Washington Symphonic Brass
- Dallas Wind Symphony

Vice Chancellor Edd Bivin announces retirement

EDD E. BIVIN, 63, TCU VICE CHANCELLOR for administrative services, has announced he will retire from the University after 32 years, effective May 31. His last official day on campus was May 14.

Although he joined TCU as a coordinator of residence hall staffing, Bivin has worked in the areas of plant management and administrative services since the late 1970s. During that time, he has overseen the construction of several multimillion-dollar buildings on campus and a three-year renovation project to refit outdated classrooms and laboratories.

The Fort Worth native and 1963 graduate of TCU taught history at Eastern Hills High School until the early 1970s when he returned to campus for his master's of education degree. TCU hired Bivin in 1971.

Since he was a teenager, Bivin has maintained an active sideline interest in raising and judging purebred dogs.

While still a TCU undergraduate, he already had become a show judge for the American Kennel Club. In addition to exhibiting their own animals at dog shows around the nation, Bivin and his wife, Irene (also an AKC judge), have spent the past three decades traveling to venues at home and abroad to judge competitions.

Both have been breed judges at the prestigious Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show in New York City numerous times over the years. Bivin's experience there culminated in being chosen to judge "Best in Show" at the 1999 event. Mrs. Bivin's turn at that distinguished honor came this past February.

"It's a good time to retire," says Bivin, noting that TCU has no plans to begin a major construction project in the next few years, while he has had several invitations to judge upcoming major international dog shows. "I'll have plenty to do," he notes. "Certainly, life will be different, but I look at retirement as a chance to embrace the future rather than reflect on the past." ♦

Harry B. Parker appointed chair of theatre department

DR. HARRY B. PARKER, DIRECTOR OF theatre and a tenured professor of theatre at Emporia State University, Emporia, KS, has accepted the position of chair of the theatre department at TCU. He will arrive on campus in late July.

In making the announcement, **Scott Sullivan** (dean, College of Fine Arts) said, "We are very pleased to have a person of

Harry Parker's talent and experience agree to lead our theatre department in the midst of a period of dramatic increase in size and reputation." There are currently 115 theatre majors in the department.

A 1980 magna cum laude graduate of TCU in theatre arts, Dr. Parker received an M.A. degree in directing/acting from the University of Kansas in 1982 and a Ph.D. degree in theatre and film from the University of Kansas in 1992.

Prior to joining ESU in 1992, Dr. Parker taught in and directed the division of theatre arts and dance at Westmar University in LeMars, Iowa. He is married to the former Karen Turley (also a TCU graduate), and they have two children.

Just this month, Dr. Parker was elected to a three-year term as a member-at-large on the national committee of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival.

"I am delighted to be joining the outstanding theatre department at TCU," said Dr. Parker. "My training at TCU as an undergraduate gave me excellent preparation for a career in theatre, and I am looking forward to helping new generations of students achieve their goals as well." ♦

Barnett Scholar will talk on "The Significance of Jerusalem for Judaism"

THE PROGRAM IN JEWISH STUDIES AT TCU and Brite Divinity School will sponsor a lecture at University Christian Church at 7 p.m. Wednesday, May 28.

Avigdor Shinan, professor of Jewish literature at Hebrew University in Jerusalem, will give a free public lecture on "The Significance of Jerusalem for Judaism." The event is in conjunction to his being named the Third Annual Barnett International Visiting Scholar of Jewish Studies. A reception and book signing will follow the lecture at UCC.

Shinan has served as a visiting professor at Yale University, the Jewish Theological Seminary, Yeshiva University and, now, Brite Divinity School. He will teach a two-week graduate seminar titled *Literature of the Ancient Synagogue* at Brite.
