Rising piano stars, music teachers, amateurs here for TCU Cliburn Institute

INSPIRING THE YOUNG AND HOPEFUL. Stimulating the longtime teacher. Affirming the amateur. Each year, the TCU/Cliburn Piano Institute invites students like these to immerse themselves in the study of piano performance, technique and repertoire with world-class professionals.

The Institute unfolds on campus every summer, and is in session now through June 29. This year's crop of piano talent includes more than 80 musicians who will perform and many more who are here just to listen to the others. There are 24 young artists selected by audition from the major music conservatories of the world and another 10 attending on their own, 41 piano teachers from across the country and 23 amateurs from as far away as Germany and England.

Founded in 1981 by **Tamás Ungár** (School of Music), the Institute is a cooperative venture between TCU and the Cliburn Foundation which presents the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition in Fort Worth every four years. Tamás continues to organize and oversee the Institute's three-faceted program. "The standard is very high this year," he says, noting that the audition tapes sent by the aspiring professional pianists are "the highest level of performance the jury has ever heard here."

Private lessons and master classes, taught by a distinguished faculty of international pianists, teachers, conductors and composers, are at the heart of the three-week Young Artists Program. The Institute is open to the community through various piano concerts on campus and master classes which may be audited. This month, master pianists (who double as Institute faculty) will perform solo concerts in PepsiCo Recital Hall. Tickets, \$20 for general admission, \$15 for senior citizens and teachers and \$10 for students, are available through Central Ticket Office at 817-335-9000.

School in July 2000. He will undertake a new position in fall 2004 at the University of Arizona as department head and professor of marketing in the Eller College of Business and Public Administration.

"The tireless work and support of university administrators, faculty, staff and students has established a strong foundation upon which the Neeley School can use to continue its march toward the top 50."

"Our move to Tucson allows me to return to my hometown and devote virtually all of my efforts to teaching and research," Dr. Lusch added. "Importantly, I will be working closely with doctoral students in business, thereby helping in some small way to address the national shortage of business faculty."

Gardening tip from Robert Sulak in physical plant: Fertilize rose beds every four to six weeks. Apply small amounts of fertilizer high in nitrogen after a flush of bloom or every four to six weeks.
