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ABC-TV film critic Joel Siegel will speak at Gates of Chai event Sept. 16

FILM CRITIC JOEL SIEGEL WILL BE GUEST speaker at the sixth annual Gates of Chai Lectureship of Brite Divinity School at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 16 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. His lecture is titled "Being Jewish in America," and will include an audio/visual presentation on Judaism and cinema.

Tickets go on sale today. Reserved seats with priority parking are \$35 and must be arranged in advance. General admission is \$15. Student admission is free. Call ext. 6679 for tickets or ext. 7804 for information.

Widely known for his 20-plus years of humorous and insightful contributions as entertainment editor for *Good Morning America* on ABC-TV, Siegel also is the author of the recently published *Lessons for Dylan*, a book that is a legacy of his life and Jewish heritage to leave behind for his young son. Experiencing fatherhood for the first time in his mid-50s, Siegel was simultaneously being treated for cancer, which made him poignantly aware that he might not live to see his child grow up (although he is now doing well).

His book contains what *The New York Times* has called a "disarming assortment of things he would like Dylan to know." These include a history of the Jews in four jokes, a list of movies he hopes to watch with his boy (*Singin' in the Rain*, *To Kill a Mockingbird*, lots of Billy Wilder), advice about college,

drugs and sex ("Ask your mother"), show biz stories, a Yiddish glossary and his grandmother's brisket recipe.

A native of Los Angeles, where he graduated cum laude from UCLA, Siegel began his career with an assortment of jobs: a radio newscaster, book reviewer for the *Los Angeles Times*, freelance writer for Sen. Robert Kennedy and an ad agency copywriter/producer responsible for inventing Baskin-Robbins ice cream flavors.

Siegel is president of Gilda's Club in New York City, which he and actor Gene Wilder founded in 1991 to honor the late comedienne Gilda Radner. The non-profit center offers emotional and social support for cancer patients.

He is the only drama critic ever to receive a Tony Award nomination ... for writing the book for *The First*, a Broadway musical based on Jackie Robinson's breakthrough into major league baseball.

The Gates of Chai Lectureship in Contemporary Judaism is an integral part of the Program in Jewish Studies at TCU and Brite Divinity School. It is designed to promote informed, dynamic public dialogue and education on issues of relevance to contemporary Judaism. ♦

City to crack down on street parking in area

EFFECTIVE SOME TIME THIS FALL, THE City of Fort Worth will begin ticketing and towing vehicles parked on streets in the TCU neighborhood.

The affected streets include north/south thoroughfares from University Drive west to Highview Terrace and east to Stanley Ave. Affected east/west streets include McPherson, Cantey, Lowden, Bowie and Bellaire Drive. On some streets, parking will be allowed on one side only.

According to J.C. Williams (TCU Police), city crews will be erecting NO PARKING signs as their workload allows, which means the situation on a particular street could change overnight. Fort Worth Police will be working with campus organizations, residence halls and at athletic events to get
