Employees can access their benefits, personal info and more at my.tcu.edu

TCU FACULTY AND STAFF CAN ACCESS, manage and update benefits and personal information with the click of a mouse beginning next week when a revamped my.tcu.edu portal is launched on campus.

The data-driven portal, which was originally introduced to the TCU community last year, has been integrated with the University's PeopleSoft program and now gives employees the opportunity to access information such as medical and dental coverage, previous and current paychecks, dependent and health care spending account data, benefits coverage for dependents and beneficiaries, and vacation and sick leave activity and balances through the employee self-service link.

In addition, employees can update information such as home addresses, phone numbers, emergency contact information and even review federal tax withholding exemptions and set up a direct deposit account.

The portal can be accessed from any computer with Internet access using a Web browser such as Internet Explorer and operates much like other user portals found on the World Wide Web. Employees also can add TCU e-mail, calendars, news and much more information by customizing their individual portals.

"my.tcu.edu will give employees easy, one-stop access to their benefits and personal

information," said Mike Ten Eyck, manager of administrative information services. "The ability to manage and update information at your own convenience makes this portal an attractive and useful tool for employees."

Access to your personal information is secure, and can only be accessed by entering your personal TCU user ID and password. Mike encourages all users to safeguard their personal information any time they step away from the computer, by either locking the screen or logging out of the my.tcu.edu portal.

TCU employees aren't the only ones who will be using the new portal. Beginning next week, students will have to use <u>my.tcu.edu</u> to register for classes, sign up for on-campus housing and check TCU account information.

Faculty and staff will have the opportunity to see the new self-service link on Wednesday when the human resources staff hosts 20-minute demonstrations in the Brown-Lupton Student Center 205 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

NASDAQ Center of Entrepreneurial Excellence Award at the National Consortium of Entrepreneurship Center (NCEC) Directors conference Saturday, Oct. 4. The conference was hosted by the Ryffel Center for Entrepreneurial Studies.

"It is an honor to be recognized for this award," said **David Minor**, director of the Ryffel Center for Entrepreneurial Studies. "This award truly speaks to the dedication and success of our Center which is only three years old."

The NASDAQ award is bestowed upon entrepreneurship centers that have made remarkable advancements in the entrepreneurial field. Three honorees were selected this year. The others were University of Notre Dame and University of Colorado-Boulder.

The NASDAQ award honors those centers that have made and will continue to advance entrepreneurship as a driving force of economic growth.

Over 90 schools attended the three-day conference, including Stanford University, CA; Carnegie Mellon University, PA; Napier University, Edinburgh, Scotland; Southern Methodist University and University of Chicago.

According to the Matlon Index, a data base of 24 major communications journals, and a survey of communication research productivity between 1996 and 2001conducted by Hickson, Turner & TCU's Bodon. department of communication studies was ranked No. 3 behind only Michigan State and West Virginia (both of which have doctoral programs and larger faculties). TCU outperformed such powerhouses as Ohio State University, the University of Wisconsin, the University of Texas and Northwestern University.

On the list of national prolific scholars, **Raiph Behnke** was ranked No. 5, and **Chris Sawyer**, No. 6. The TCU program ranked No. 1 in research productivity when compared only to other master's-only degree granting programs.

Gardening tip from Robert Sulak in physical plant: Plant bulbs in well-prepared beds. The base of the bulb should be at a depth that is three times the diameter of the bulb. In sandy soil, set bulbs slightly deeper; in clay soil, slightly shallower.
