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Ranch Management program to offer four-year degree

THE RANCH MANAGEMENT PROGRAM has announced plans to offer a bachelor of science degree in ranch management, beginning in the fall 2004 semester.

The degree, which will be offered in addition to the program's one-year certificate program, will require students to minor in business. The bachelor's degree will be granted from the College of Science and Engineering.

"We are excited about the new degree option because it allows students to incorporate the knowledge obtained in our program with business principles needed to manage a successful ranch," said **Jim Link**, director of the Ranch Management program. "Agriculture is a business, and we feel that expanding the business portion of the current program, combined with the latest production principles, will enable our students to be the future leaders in resource management."

Students who qualify for the program will be identified as pre-ranch management majors as freshmen and be required to complete University curriculum requirements before being accepted into the bachelor's program prior to their junior year. Once qualified, students will receive a conditional acceptance and begin work on a business minor. After completing the business minor, students will be required to complete ranch management courses to earn their degree.

Transfer students will be evaluated on an individual basis to ensure all pre-major requirements have been completed.

Gardening tip from Robert Sulak in physical plant: Holly plants with a heavy set of fruit often suffer a fertilizer deficiency. An application of complete fertilizer late this month can be helpful and provide a headstart for spring.
