Celebrate Fort Worth's past at western heritage events set for Nov. 15 game

TCU AND SCORE A GOAL IN THE Classroom will team up on Nov. 15 to host Western Heritage Day at Amon Carter Stadium. The event, held in conjunction with TCU's home football game against Cincinnati, begins at high noon and will celebrate Fort Worth's rich western heritage.

The day's events will feature fun and fanfare, including stagecoaches, wagons, horses, dancing, interactive games and booths, and a halftime performance by the LightCrust Doughboys, with the Horned Frog Marching Band and TCU Showgirls.

Many community groups, schools and businesses will be on hand to help create an authentic western atmosphere. The famous Reata restaurant will be taking reservations for a western feast, served from noon until 2 p.m.

Also, the Ranch Management Program will honor a distinguished alumnus during halftime festivities.

TCU Theatre production of *On the Town* set to run Nov. 13-16 on Ed Landreth stage

THE WALSH CENTER BOX OFFICE OPENS today to take reservations for the TCU Theatre production of the Broadway musical *On the Town*. Performances are in Ed Landreth Auditorium, at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 13 through Saturday, Nov. 15, and at 2 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 16.

With music by Leonard Bernstein, book and lyrics by Betty Comden and Adolph Green, the show follows the adventures of three sailors during a 24-hour shore leave in New York City. The 1949 film which followed the stage version starred Gene Kelly, Frank Sinatra and Vera Ellen. The score includes the legendary song *New York, New York*.

The production is directed by **T.J. Walsh**, with music direction and choreography by guests artists Hans and Mary Grim. Set design is by **Nancy McCauley**, costume design is by **LaLonne Lehman** and lighting design is by **Michael Skinner**.

"Audiences will love this funny and romantic musical about three sailors desperate to find love on a one-day leave,"

says **Harry Parker**, chair of the theatre department. "It's going to be a terrific evening, featuring great comedy and songs, exciting dancing, spectacular scenery, costumes and lighting, and a wonderful cast of 35 talented TCU students."

On the Town will be a benefit for the TCU Fine Arts Guild, which provides scholarships for students in the fields of music, dance and theater. Tickets are \$15, or \$7 for TCU students and youth. (The show is appropriate for audiences over age 6. Please do not bring children 5 and younger.)
