Feb. 1 piano concert will honor the late Lili Kraus, TCU artist-in-residence

TCU SCHOOL OF MUSIC WILL PRESENT A "Lili Kraus Centennial Celebration" piano concert at 2 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 1 in PepsiCo Recital Hall. The late Mme. Kraus was artist-in-residence at TCU from 1967 to 1981.

The program will include performances by pianists Jo Boatright, Dale Fundling and Cliburn gold medalist **José Feghali**, the current artist-in-residence in the School of Music. Admission is free.

Mme. Kraus, born in Budapest in 1903, was admired for her interpretations of the Viennese school, Haydn, Beethoven, Schubert and, above all, Mozart. She first gained critical attention for her performances of the Mozart piano and violin sonatas with Szymon Goldberg in the 1930s. During the 1966-1967 New York concert season, Kraus gave an unprecedented landmark series of performances of the complete Mozart piano concertos, recorded for the Columbia Epic label. She first came to Fort Worth and to TCU in 1963 to serve on the jury of the first Van Cliburn International Piano Competition and served on every jury thereafter until 1981. She died in 1986.

Boatright, an assistant to Mme. Kraus at TCU, is the co-founder of the Walden Piano

Quartet and was artistic director for Voices of Change for 28 years. She also was music director at the First Unitarian Church of Dallas for 43 years. Fundling, a student of Boatright's and later of Kraus, is on the faculty of the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria. For the concert, the two will perform the Mozart *Sonata for Two Pianos in D major, K. 448*. Boatright also will play the *Piano Sonata* by Bela Bartók, a pianist and composer with whom Kraus studied in Hungary.

Feghali will play the Mozart *Sonata in D major, K. 311*, and the Schubert *Sonata in A major, K. 120, D. 664*. A child prodigy in his native Brazil and winner of the 7th Cliburn Competition in 1985, Feghali has become a major presence on the international concert stage. In more than 800 performances, he has played in concerts with the renowned orchestras and conductors of the world, and has been equally active as a recitalist. He is associate director of the Mimir Chamber Music Festival at TCU and artistic director of the Texas Chamber Orchestra for the 2003-2004 season. ♦

The CEO course will be led by Connie Beck, retired market president of Bank of America San Francisco and former president of Bank of America Fort Worth and member of the Neeley School's International Board of Visitors.

"The students will study the management style, decision processes, ethics and power of CEOs," said Beck. "It is not often that

students have the chance to meet leaders of this caliber, much less to be engaged in conversation with them. The Neeley School's IBOV is committed to leading-edge education and this course is a prime opportunity for students to see how leadership in the business world is evolving." ♦
