# Neeley School workshop will focus on ethics, strategy, publicity

COMMUNICATING IN A CHANGING world is the focus of the seventh annual Corporate Communication Workshop, hosted by the Neeley School's Center for Professional Communication and Coca-Cola.

Designed to offer communication tips and techniques from leading professional development experts, the two-day workshop, begins at 8:15 a.m., Thursday, Feb. 19 and ends at 2 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 20. Cost is \$125 which includes continental breakfast and lunch for both days and take-home materials.

Keynote speaker at Friday's luncheon will be Marion Luna Brem, principal and CEO of Marion Enterprises and author of *The Seven Greatest Truths about Successful Women*, which was ranked as one of the top 10 business books of 2001. Topics for breakout sessions include crisis communication, internal strategic planning, tips for media coverage and how to give bad news in a nice way.

"This workshop is an important opportunity for professionals at all levels," said **Gay Wakefield** (CPC). "They learn from innovative thinkers and experienced workshop leaders, network with professionals and gain skills to boost their employability."

# Institute receives grant designed to change how biology is taught

TCU'S INSTITUTE OF MATHEMATICS, Science and Technology Education has been awarded a \$285,000 grant from The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB). The grant, part of federal funding under the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB), will provide new teaching techniques and materials for 105 statewide providers of professional development for biology teachers.

The professional providers will participate in workshops titled, "Contemporary Issues in Biology: A Module for Teacher Training" taught by School of Education and College of Science and Engineering faculty. Issues of Time, Newsweek and U.S. News & World Report will introduce topics of interest, such as prostate cancer, diabetes, SARS, cloning and global warming.

"Each day newspapers and news magazines contain extraordinary new discoveries in biological science," said Molly Weinburgh, TCU associate professor of education and associate director of the Institute. "These workshops are designed on our belief that students of all ages learn more when big ideas in science are connected with real-life applications." ◆
