## TCU's Texas Flags exhibit makes its debut at Bob Bullock Museum in Austin

THE CENTER FOR TEXAS STUDIES AT TCU launched a statewide tour Saturday of an exhibit featuring 29 historic Texas flags that flew over the Lone Star State from 1836-1845. The rare collection, curated by TCU history Ph.D. and noted Texas flags expert **Robert Maberry Jr.**, debuted at the Bob Bullock State History Museum in Austin. It is the first stop of a two-year, four-city tour that culminates in Fort Worth in 2006.

Sponsored by TCU, Frost Bank and Heartland Alliance, the exhibit explores the history, symbolism and events behind these rare Texas banners. Some of the unique pieces showcased on the tour include the flag from the Battle of San Jacinto in 1836, the blood-stained Guerrero Battalion Tricolor Battle Flag from the State Library and Archives Commission, a Hood Texas Brigade flag made in part from a wedding dress and two rare flags belonging to an African-American regiment of the U. S. Army that served at military outposts on the Texas frontier.

"Six flags have never been enough for Texans," said Maberry. "Throughout the state's colorful history, its people have unfurled dozens of individual designs, most sporting the lone five-point star in some form or other. These flags became the accoutrements to great events and conveyors of the myths Texans hold so dear."

The Center for Texas Studies was established in 2002 by the AddRan College of Humanities and Social Sciences. The center's mission is "To celebrate all that makes Texas distinctive."

Admission to Bullock Museum, including the "Texas Flags" exhibit, is \$5 for adults, \$4.50 for seniors and free for youth 18 years and younger. The museum is located in downtown Austin at 1800 N. SOA Watch is an independent organization dedicated to shutting down the U.S. Army's School of the Americas at Fort Benning, GA, which trains military officers and soldiers from pro-U.S. regimes within Latin America. SOA is controversial among peace activists because of the number of dictators and violence-prone soldiers among its 60,000 graduates. SOA Watch has become one of the largest nonviolent resistance movements in America, using vigils, fasts, demonstrations, nonviolent protest, media and legislative work to carry out its mission.

Bourgeois' appearance on campus is sponsored by University Ministries, Spanish and Latin American Studies, political science department, Peace Action, international student services, Christian Advocates for Peace and Social Justice, Interfaith Network for Peace and Justice and Office of Peace and Justice, Catholic Diocese of Fort Worth.

## Nursing receives grant for accelerated degree

HARRIS SCHOOL OF NURSING RECEIVED a \$286,000 grant from The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) for implementation of the first accelerated bachelor of nursing degree (BSN) in Texas. The degree and grant are a direct response to the growing shortage of nurses in Texas.

Designed for college graduates with degrees other than nursing, students in the accelerated BSN will advance to a nursing degree in 15 months. Twenty students with varied backgrounds, such as a Ph.D. in applied mathematics, public health and law, will begin the program in May 2004.

Nursing professors **Charles Walker** and **Suzy Lockwood**, co-authors of the grant, say that TCU's accelerated BSN will act as a model for other schools to duplicate. For more information, call Charles at ext. 7520 or Suzy at ext. 6758. ♦
