Wednesday inauguration of Chancellor Boschini to be campuswide celebration

CHANCELLOR VICTOR J. BOSCHINI JR. WILL BE officially installed as TCU's 10th chancellor at 10 a.m. Wednesday in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum during a ceremony that will honor the University's traditions while boldly examining its future. Afterwards, all attendees are invited to a lunch at the Kelly Center.

The inauguration, themed "Vision In Action: Enhancing the TCU Experience," represents the public recognition of Dr. Boschini as chancellor and provides him the opportunity to underscore the University's future and, in particular, his vision for TCU students' total collegiate expérience.

The ceremony will begin with a procession of campus community delegates that will include faculty, staff, international students, student leaders and, for the first time, TCU trustees. During the inauguration, Nadia Lahutsky, professor of religion and chair of the Faculty Senate, and John V. Roach, chair of TCU's board of trustees, will present the University Medallion to Dr. Boschini, a symbolic University tradition signifying the official investiture of office and the strength

and continuity of the University. A link added to the medallion chain will signify the recognition of Dr. Boschini as TCU's newest chancellor.

Dr. George Kuh, professor of higher education at Indiana University, Bloomington, and director of its National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE), is the inauguration keynote speaker. Other ceremony highlights include one- to two-minute poetry or book readings by faculty, staff and students and remarks from Michael J. Moncrief, mayor of Fort Worth, Pam Roach Thomas, president of the TCU Alumni Association, Laura Miller, board of TCU trustees and Jay Zeidman, president of TCU's Student Government Association.

The inauguration will be capped by a series of celebratory events including TCU's Honors Convocation at 11 a.m. Thursday in Ed Landreth Auditorium, a three-day International Socrates Symposium, and a Town Hall meeting at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, titled "The TCU Experience: What Makes Us Unique?" •

Month-long TCU Latin American Arts Festival opens with theater, dance

WHAT BEGAN AS A WEEK OF CLASSICAL music on the campus in 1998 becomes a month-long celebration of Hispanic heritage this year. TCU's 2004 Latin American Arts Festival kicks off this weekend with theater and dance productions and concludes with several days of music events April 19-24.

The days between will feature a lecture, films that celebrate the talent and culture of Mexico, the countries of South America and Spain, and an exhibition of pre-Columbian art.

TCU Theatre presents *Burning Patience* at 7:30 p.m. Thursday through Saturday in the Hays Theater. The play, written by Antonio Skarmeta, is the story of renowned Chilean poet Pablo Neruda and is the basis for the Italian film *Il Postino* (*The Postman*). General admission is \$10 for adults, \$5 for students and seniors. For reservations, phone the box office at ext. 5770.

Ballet and modern dance presents its spring dance concert at 8 p.m. Friday and

Saturday and 2 p.m. Saturday and Sunday in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Titled Fronteras Entrelazadas (Interwoven Borders), performances feature choreography by TCU faculty and guest artists Sabrina Castillo of Momentum modern dance company (Guatemala), New York-based choreographer Jessica Lang and Miguel Mancillas of Antares dance company (Mexico), as well as Choreographer-in-Residence Fernando Bujones.

Flute virtuoso James Galway teaching here today

THE SCHOOL OF MUSIC IS HOSTING a flute masterclass by Sir James Galway from 3 - 8 p.m. today in PepsiCo Recital Hall. While TCU music students will be part of the class, it is also drawing participants from the Texas Flute Society. More than 300 flutists are expected to attend, according to organizer **Karen Adrian** (School of Music). Admission is \$35, which entitles attendees to bring a flute.

Galway and his wife, Lady Jeanne Galway, who is also a flutist, will present a concert at Bass Performance Hall at 8 p.m. Tuesday as part of the Cliburn Concerts series.

Galway, a native of Belfast, Ireland, is regarded as both a supreme interpreter of the classical flute repertoire and a consummate entertainer whose appeal crosses all musical boundaries. He has recorded over 50 albums on RCA.

Kinesiology bringing in noted diabetes expert as Green Honors Chair

THE DEPARTMENT OF KINESIOLOGY hosts Dr. Abhimanyu Garg, a leading researcher on diabetes as a Green Honors Chair Thursday, April 1. He will present four lectures between 9:30 a.m. - 6 p.m., ranging from proper diet for diabetics to understanding inherited and acquired fat storing diseases. All lectures are free and open to the public.

Dr. Garg is a professor of internal medicine and chief of the division of nutrition and metabolic diseases at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. He also is a senior clinical nutrition research scholar and associate program director in the Center for Human Nutrition at UT Southwestern Medical Center, and director of the diabetes clinic at the VA North Texas Health Care System in Dallas.
