Chancellor Boschini will address campus at University Convocation on Thursday

CHANCELLOR VICTOR J. BOSCHINI JR. will address the University community during Convocation at 11 a.m. Thursday in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Faculty and administrators in full regalia will lead the colorful procession.

Chancellor Boschini also will present the Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Teaching.

Nominees are eight faculty members who have already received their School and College awards this year: **C. David Grant** and **John T. Harvey** (AddRan College), **Robert L. Vigeland** (Neeley School), **Melissa J. Young** (College of Communication), **Nancy B. Meadows** (School of Education), **Babette Bohn** (College of Fine Arts), **Patricia J. Bradley** (College of Health & Human Sciences) and **Ray W. Drenner** (College of Science & Engineering).

The Wassenich Award for Mentoring in the TCU Community will be presented to a member of the faculty or staff in recognition and celebration of this person's mentoring of students. The honor was created in 1999 through an endowment established by TCU alumni Mark and Linda Wassenich of Dallas. Because of their own rich experiences as TCU students, the couple founded the unique mentoring award to highlight the value TCU places on key relationships with faculty and staff which help students develop, succeed and contribute to their communities.

This year's finalists are: **John A. Breyer** (geology), **Lynn K. Flahive** (communication sciences and disorders), **Mary Martin Patton** (education) and **Carrie Zimmerman** (student development services).

University organist **Joe Butler** will play for the processional and recessional. The TCU Concert Chorale, under the direction of **Ron Shirey**, will perform. **Richard Estes** will be the soloist, and accompanists are **Janet Pummill** and her daughter, Julie Pummill.

University minister **Angela Kaufman** will deliver the invocation and the benediction.

As long as offices are covered, all faculty, staff and students are encouraged to attend.

A First Annual Founders' Celebration will begin as soon as Convocation lets out, on the east campus lawn near the statue of Addison and Randolph Clark. Music will be provided by the TCU Jazz Combo.

The celebration offers an opportunity for faculty, students and all staff members to kick off TCU's 132nd year since its founding in an

informal, festive atmosphere. In the event of rain, it will be moved to the Student Center ballroom.

Memorabilia from the family of Addison and Randolph Clark will be displayed in Mary Couts Burnett Library Sept. 9 - 24. Items include photos, documents and personal belongings, as well as *The Horned Frog* yearbook from 1897-1898. ♦

James Carville and Mary Matalin will speak at the Fogelson Honors Forum Oct. 6

HIGH-PROFILE POLITICAL INSIDERS James Carville and Mary Matalin will be the featured speakers at this year's Fogelson Honors Forum at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 6 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Co-authors of the national best-seller *All's Fair: Love, War and Running for President*, the couple will present their distinctive (and often opposing) views on current political issues. The event is part of the "Politics & Principles" Theme Semester.

Recognized by his outspoken opinions delivered in a Southern drawl, Democrat James Carville became known for his savvy as a political strategist during Bill Clinton's 1992 presidential campaign (credited with crafting the infamous "It's the economy, stupid!" message). He became a household name with the release of the Academy Award-nominated documentary *The War Room*, a behind-the-scenes look at Clinton's campaign.

Along with Paul Begala, Carville squares off against his conservative counterparts, Robert Novak and Tucker Carlson, as co-host of *Crossfire* on CNN. He has appeared with Matalin, his wife of 10 years, on the HBO series *K Street*, about the world of powerful political consultants, and had a cameo role in the popular 2003 film *Old School*. Carville's latest book is titled *Had Enough? A Handbook for Fighting Back*.

Mary Matalin, a top Republican strategist, had a senior position in George H.W. Bush's 1988 presidential campaign and now serves as chief advisor for the current campaign to re-elect President George W. Bush and Vice

President Dick Cheney. She also has served as co-host of CNN's *Crossfire* and of *Equal Time* on CNBC, and has written a book for the couple's two children, titled *Letters To My Daughters*.

A successful Texas oilman and rancher, Buddy Fogelson attended TCU in 1919 and 1920. DR. DAN POWELL, SUPERINTENDENT of schools for the Everman Independent School District since 1997, has joined the faculty of the School of Education. His retirement from the Everman ISD is effective Nov. 30. He also served as an assistant superintendent for the Fort Worth ISD from 1986 to 1997.

This fall Dan is teaching three master's-level classes in education: Administrators and Teachers, Administrative Internship (for those seeking certification as principals) and Managing Instructional Processes, a special problems class.

Dan joined the Fort Worth district as an elementary school teacher in 1974 and served in various administrative positions before being promoted to assistant superintendent in 1986. A graduate of TCU, he received his master's and doctoral degrees in education from the University of North Texas in Denton. ♦

Psychology Green Chair will speak on attachment and foster children

DR. MARY DOZIER, THE AMY E. DUPONT Chair of Child Development at the University of Delaware, will be the 2004 Cecil and Ida Green Honors Chair for psychology. She will speak from 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 14 in Sid Richardson Lecture Hall 4.

Her talk is titled "Attachment and Biobehavioral Catch-Up: An Intervention Targeting Young Foster Children's Needs."

Dr. Dozier specializes in serious disorders of attachment relationships. She is best known for her work with foster families, where she has studied the impact of disrupted relationships on infant psychobiological development, and is seeking to improve mental health services for infants in foster care. KUDOS

Dr. Daisy L. Machado (Brite) has been presented the 2004 Virgilio Elizondo Award by the Academy of Catholic Hispanic Theologians of the United States. The award is given to an individual "for distinguished achievement in theology, in keeping with the mission of the Academy."

Daisy was honored based on her stature within the Hispanic/Latino/a theological community and on her singular efforts to build bridges across religious, denominational and theological boundaries.

Born in Cuba, Daisy was raised and educated in New York. She has an M.Div. degree from Union Theological Seminary and was the first U.S. Latina ordained as a minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the first Protestant Latina-American to earn a Ph.D. degree in theology.

In Spring 2003, she was invited to teach urban ministry at Harvard Divinity School and, in the fall, was named as one of "100 Most Influential Hispanics" in the October 2003 issue of *Hispanic Business* magazine.

U.S. News and World Report has ranked TCU 98th among the top 120 Best National Universities. TCU continues to outdo other

Texas schools for alumni giving, ranking in the 28th percentile for giving, higher than Baylor and SMU, but lower than Rice's 36 percent (based on FY 2004). Our SAT profiles have moved up to 1060-1260 from 1030-1250 and we continue to offer a high percentage of classes with fewer than 20 students (45 percent) and a low percentage of classes with 50 or more students (nine percent). These class statistics are from 2003.

Our Neeley School of Business has done well in the rankings, moving up to 77th from 83rd in the best undergraduate business school rankings. The Neeley School's entrepreneurship program was ranked 20th among business schools with an undergraduate specialty in entrepreneurship.

TCU's engineering program also has done well. This year, we are ranked 39th among programs whose terminal degree is the bachelor's or master's. Last year we were ranked in the 40th percentile.
