Board of Trustees approves 2005 - 2006 budget; elects J. Luther King as new chair

TCU'S BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPROVED A \$269 million budget for the 2005 - 2006 academic year at their winter meeting Friday.

Budget highlights include:

- \$4.9 million for faculty and staff compensation, including funds to address beginning wages and salary compression among non-exempt staff
- \$2.9 million to support academic excellence, including 18 new faculty appointments to support the TCU Core which begins fall 2005
- \$2.7 million to strengthen financial aid, an eight percent increase
- \$1.0 million to improve the student experience through residential and career services, and health and counseling center services.

The Board of Trustees also set tuition for the 2005 - 2006 academic year. New and returning full-time students will pay a combined tuition and fee of \$21,280 from the current \$19,700. Part-time students will pay \$740 to \$900 in tuition and fees per hour based upon the number of hours taken. Financial aid will be raised in proportion to the tuition increase. Tuition and fees for graduate students are separate.

In other business, trustee **J. Luther King** of Luther King Capital Management, was elected to serve as chair of the board, effective June 1. Trustee **Clarence Scharbauer III** was elected vice chair, also effective June 1. Current chair **John V. Roach**, who served for 24 years on the Board of Trustees, including 15 years as chair, will oversee his final board meeting April 14 - 15. Roach made numerous valuable contributions to TCU during his tenure as chair. He led the "1990s Project" which set the University's agenda for the coming decade, was an active participant in many of the University's most significant achievements, including leading the effort to build the \$25 million Tucker Technology Center, and consistently set the agenda for conservative fiscal management and championed balanced budgets. He and his wife, Jean, both alumni of TCU, also were instrumental in the establishment of KinderFrogs, a preschool for children with Down syndrome.

Additionally, the board addressed the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) warning related to minor procedural changes in the trustees' bylaws. The trustees' discussed changes in the bylaw language and that information will be forwarded to SACS. The

Currently, the University has received 7,191 applications, up from 7,038 applications last year, for 1,550 places in the freshman class. SAT scores also continue to rise up from 1147.9 to 1161.6.

School of Nurse Anesthesia hosting internationally known anesthesiologist

THE SCHOOL OF NURSE ANESTHESIA WILL host Dr. Edmond Eger, a leading researcher on inhaled anesthetics, as a continuing education presentation Wednesday, from 1:30-3:30 p.m. in Sid Richardson, LH 1. The event is free and open to the public.

Dr. Eger, professor of anesthesia and perioperative care at University of California, San Francisco, is an internationally known expert on inhaled anesthetics, including discoverer of some agents. He received an M.D. from Northwestern University Medical School, interned at St. Luke's Hospital in Chicago, and completed his residency in anesthesia at the University of Iowa. He has been honored by receipt of the ASA Award for Excellence in Research and the Distinguished Service Award. He is a Fellow, Royal College of Anesthetists of England and Ireland. ♦
